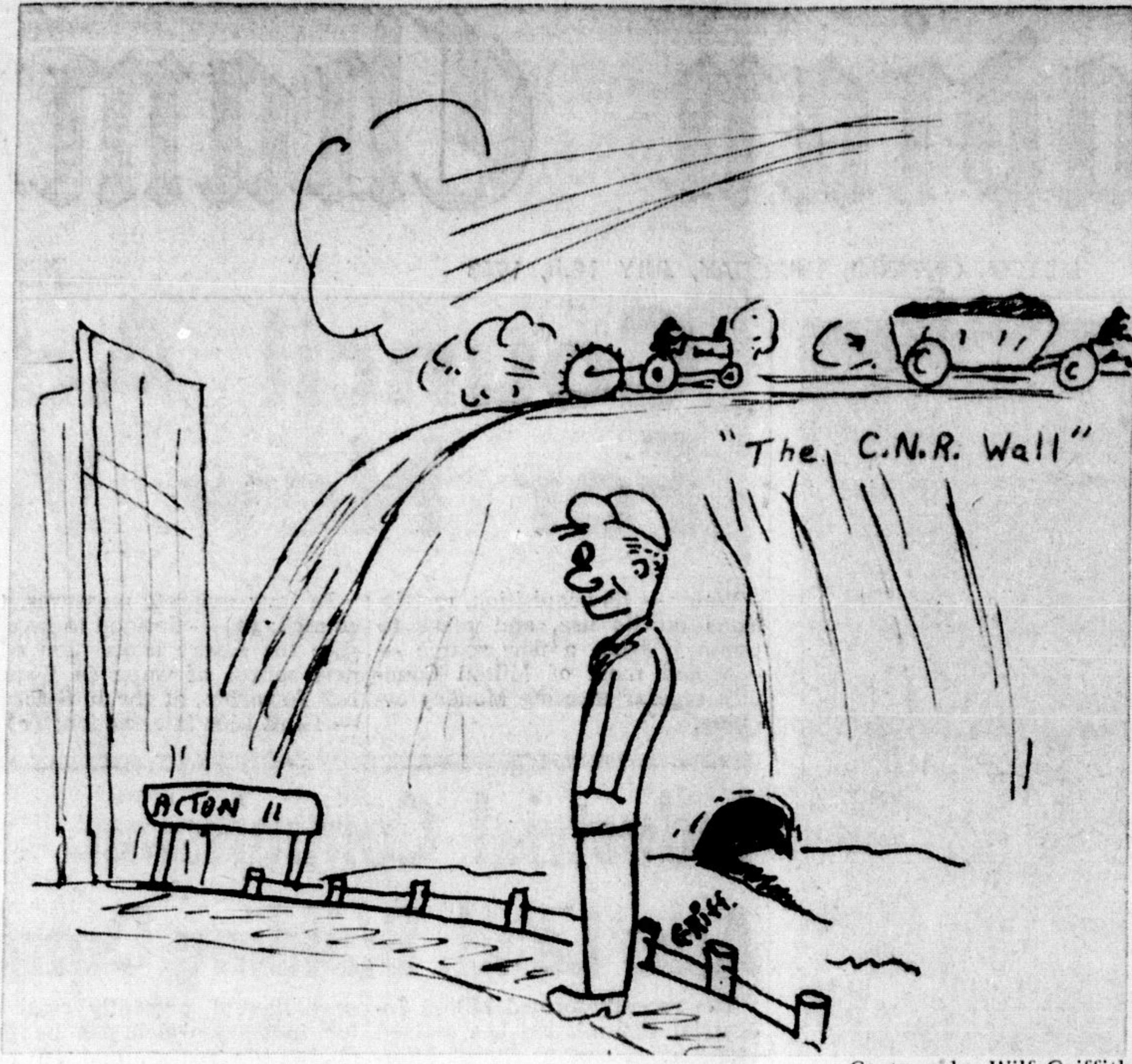

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**WHERE DO ALL THE OLD TAXIS GO?**

Well, some of them, like old army generals, fade quietly away and add to the piles of scrap metal yards. This is a fitting and useful end for old taxis, in our opinion.

Then there is at least one firm in the country that has built quite a business out of buying up old taxis — cheaply of course — and selling them in South America as "North American used cars." This could help explain some of the "Yankee Go Home" sentiment down there we've heard about.

But quite a few old taxis still stick around the home market after they have finished their days pounding the pavements for their original commercial owners. They become "Sensational Buys" and "Bargains That Can't Be Beaten." They make quite a lot of money, too, for the operator who buys them at the right figure and sells them, after some inexpensive doctoring up, as a "Terrific Deal" for a far better than average used car profit.

A taxi, or police cruiser, or any worn out car, can be fixed up to run and look alright TEMPORARILY while you test it and sign the papers. If you would avoid buying such a car, then your best protection is to confine your purchases to dealers, like ourselves, who refuse to handle them.

**THOUSANDS OF CANADIANS** may suffer damage to their good sight if they do not take precautions when viewing the July 20 eclipse. The Canadian National Institute for the Blind says if you watch the eclipse with the naked eye, you may suffer damage to vision for the rest of your life. The CNIB points out that sun glasses, polaroid lens, coloured glass, binoculars and even welder's goggles do not provide sufficient protection for watching the eclipse in safety. Ultra-violet rays of the sun, invisible to the naked eye, focus on the retina. Irreparable burns result which appear as dark patches in the field of vision for the rest of your life. The CNIB suggests the safest method is to view the eclipse on television. A second suggestion — use a large piece of thick glass, heavily smoked in the flame of a candle. And thirdly, expose unused film to the light. Develop it and view the eclipse through at least two thicknesses.

**Bureau Locates Work For 433 During June**

June was an excellent month for the National Employment Service Bureau in Oakville, manager E. L. Hartwell reports this week. During the month, the bureau found jobs for 111 females and 322 men, making a total of 433 persons finding work through the Oakville office. As of the end of the month, it was estimated that there are still 296 females and 266 men in this area unemployed.

One problem facing the local office is that more jobs are required for the large number of clerical workers registered and the National Employment Service is making a concerted effort to find openings for this type of worker.
