



**WORKMEN WILL START NEXT WEEK** to tear down a building that is linked with Milton's past history — the 106-year-old mill building at Robin Hood Flour Mills, Martin St. The stone structure was erected in 1857 at a cost of \$30,000 and was used until about a year ago for grinding flour with power generated by water from the nearby mill pond. A February fire gutted the mill and wrecking crews moved in this week to begin knocking the remaining charred walls down.

**Two Grants**

A county grant of \$3,000 will apply on the Bronte St. crossing and a 50 per cent grant will apply on the balance from the Department of Highways.

Members concluded it would be wiser to pay the amount from current funds and risk a year-end deficit, than to finance the whole amount by debentures and increase interest payments.

**Legion Works "Behind Scenes" Provide Fence, Patrol for Show**

Milton members of the Canadian Legion are pitching in to make this year's Steam Show a success by contributing some "behind-the-scenes" work.

The local members have agreed to erect the necessary snow fence at the fair grounds on Saturday August 24, and provide a night and day patrol around the fences during the show itself.

The work of the Legion was praised this week by Chamber of Commerce president Brian Best as a major contribution to the success of the Steam Show. He noted plans for the Old Fashioned Week, that were also designed to focus attention on the Steam Show, were developing well with service clubs, merchants and individuals co-operating.

**Police Investigate 244 July Complaints**

Milton Police investigated 244 complaints during July, according to a report submitted to Milton Council on Monday evening.

The Milton Police also investigated 13 accidents, issued 33 parking tickets, laid 121 charges under the Highway Traffic Act, two charges under the Liquor Control Act and six charges under the Criminal Code. Warnings during the month totalled 55 and fines were \$1,261 plus costs of \$423.

**Truck Rams Train Driver Injures Arm**

A tow truck driver received a sprained arm and damage totalled \$1,700 when the truck collided with a shunting freight train in Milton Monday evening.

Fred Arnold, 23, of R.R. 5, Milton, was the driver of the tow truck, owned by Hornby Garage. It received \$1,200 damage when the truck came over a hill approaching the C.N.R. tracks on the Base Line. The driver said the road was wet and slippery, and he did not see the stopped train until it was too late. There are no flashing lights at this crossing.

The train suffered \$500 damage when the tow truck hit the wheels of a tank car containing gas.

**GOT A SCARE**

An American tourist got a scare on Highway 401 just east of Milton last Thursday, when a loose truck wheel careened across the highway toward his car. The wheel didn't miss the target, and caused \$80 damage to the car. It happened when a King Shows maintenance truck overturned on the eastbound lane. A truck wheel flew off, crossed the median strip, and hit the American's car. A passenger in the truck was hospitalized but the driver was uninjured.

**HIT AND RUN**

A hit-and-run driver caused \$80 damage to a Miltonian's car Friday, in a two-car collision on Highway 25 at the Base Line intersection. A 1955 Pontiac struck a car driven by Mrs. Ann Marie Caon, Ontario St., but continued down the Base Line without stopping. North Halton O.P.P. are still seeking the driver.

**WIDEN LANES**

Crews are working to widen the cut-off lanes on Highway 401 at the Highway 25 Milton overpass. They are widening lanes for north and southbound traffic off 401.

**Damage is \$320 Three Accidents**

Milton Police investigated three accidents this week, with total property damage estimated at \$320.

On August 9, a car parked along Main St. received \$10 damage. The driver of the other car did not remain at the scene of the accident.

On August 10, an accident at the Liquor Control Board Parking Lot on Main St. resulted in \$275 damage. A car driven by Claude Sampson of Kingsleigh Court collided with a car owned by C. Cutting of Toronto. Damage to the Sampson car was \$20. Damage to the Cutting car was \$55. A nearby fence received \$200 damage.

The third accident took place on August 13, with damage estimated at \$35.

**Can Town Dictate Taxi Hours? Council Reviews Application**

A taxi application from John Crowe to Milton Council Monday, sparked a discussion on whether or not 24-hour taxi service was available in town.

Councillor G. Purdy suggested applicants for taxi licenses should be prepared to assure 24-hour service. He cited the needs of nurses and others to get to the hospital or Manor at odd hours. "We license taxis to service the public and we should expect them to offer 24-hour service," he continued.

Councillor C. Johnson suggested the town couldn't dictate the terms of operation for a business. "That's pretty dictatorial," Councillor C. Wilson argued.

Councillor Purdy suggested perhaps the present operators could work out something where at least one would be available at odd hours.

Council agreed to review the provincial legislation under which their license taxis, before acting on Mr. Crowe's application.
