# Clutch Hitting, Strong Pitching Leads All-Stars to 7 - 2 Victory Doug Hyatt Receives M.V.P. Award

Combining clutch hitting with strong pitching, the Halton County All-Stars downed the Galt Terriers 7-2 in the Halton County All-Star game in Campbellville Sunday afternoon. A crowd estimated at 1,000 saw three All-Star pitchers hold the Terriers to 10 scattered hits and two runs, while the All-Star sluggers bunched their 11 hits for seven runs.

Campbellville's All-Star veteran Jack Roberts started on the mound and allowed one unearned run during his three inning stint. During his stay he gave up three hits and his mates committed two errors.

Oakville Oak righthander Gary Hughes, hurled the middle three innings and permitted one run and three hits. Campbellville lefty Gary Field hurled the final three frames and shut out the Terriers while allowing four hits.

**Score Once**

The Terriers, providing the opposition for the second time in three years, opened the scoring in the first inning when Ray Upper doubled, reached third on an error and scored on Larry Cunningham's flyout to centre field. The lead was shortlived however,

as the Stars countered twice in their half of the inning.

Leadoff man Joe Iannuzzi of Hamilton doubled sharply down the right field line and scored when the next batter Stu King of Campbellville, followed suit and doubled down the same line. Al Wingrove, the third batter in the inning, reached base on an error while King scored from second for the second run of the frame.

In the second inning the All-Stars again battered Galt starter Eric Lomax, scoring once on two singles and a double. Leadoff man Doug Hyatt of Milton singled through the middle, reached third on a long fly to centre by Jack Roberts and scored on an infield single by Al Wingrove.

**Scoreless**

The third and fourth innings were scoreless, but in the fifth the Stars built their lead to 4-1. Galt reliever Hank Todd started the inning by striking out Wingrove, but Don McPhail of Dundas walked, moved to third on a single by Earl Cairns and scored when Oakville's Ross Dryden grounded out.

The Terriers got one run back

in the sixth as Gary Hughes walked Cunningham, catcher Pat Lutz singled and third baseman Ron Smith doubled Cunningham home.

**Belt Lethander**

In the seventh inning the Stars jumped on Galt leftlander Ken Lavis for two more runs. Stu King opened the inning with his second hit of the game, a single, and scored on a double by teammate Al Wingrove. Earl Cairns of Campbellville closed out the inning's scoring, as his single plated Wingrove.

The Stars closed out the scoring in the eighth inning when Campbellville pitcher Gary Field belted a long home run over the left field fence.

All-Star manager Len Andrews used only one substitute during the game, Oakville catcher Tom Byers pinch-hit for Gary Hughes in the sixth inning. A look through the All-Star lineup shows: Joe Iannuzzi of Hamilton with a single and a double; Don McPhail of Dundas with a walk; Earl Cairns of Campbellville with two singles and a walk; Doug Hyatt with a single; Doug McCutcheon of Milton with a walk, Jack

Roberts with a double and Gary Field with a home run. Oakville third baseman Ross Dryden was the only hitter on the team who did not reach base safely.

Pete McMullen, president of the Halton County Baseball Association for the past 16 years, presented the trophies to the division winners and thanked the crowd of nearly 1,000 for coming out to the game and boosting minor baseball within the county.

**HOW IMPORTANT IS AN M.V.P.?** This question came to mind Sunday, when Doug Hyatt of the Milton Red Sox was chosen the most valuable player in the Halton County Intermediate League.

Doug is without question the leader of the Red Sox team. His coach Cliff Houston has oftentimes repeated it and his teammates join the chorus that hail him as the spark plug of the club. The necessary requisites to be the club leader are the same as those necessary to be its Most Valuable Player.

First you must have ability and in Doug, this is unquestioned. Each year he hits around the .300 mark, sometimes 25 points over, sometimes 10 points under. Each year he fields his position flawlessly, keeping opposing base runners honest, for no one has ever accused him of being afraid to throw the ball around.

Besides the ability to make the right plays and get the timely hit, an M.V.P. must possess the so-called intangible characteristics... the qualities such as holler and sincerity and durability, that make the rest of the players on the club respect and follow the leadership of a teammate.

All these things Doug possesses and one has to attend only a single Red Sox game, to see these things personified in Doug's efforts. Whether the umpires know it or not, they picked a man who sells tickets, scrapes diamonds, chases balls and plays every position that his manager asks him to, and does each with superb skill without tiring or complaining.

Just after the award was presented Sunday, we heard Doug tell Jack Roberts, "there's plenty of players in the league that deserve it more than I do," but we won't believe, nor will his teammates.
