Firemen Urge Check Heating Equipment

Cooling weather and the fall heating season are here, and Milton Fire Department members today issued a warning to householders about having their heating equipment properly checked before using it.

Every year the Fire Department receives calls to extinguish fires caused by faulty equipment, and most of them could have been avoided if the homeowner had the furnace properly inspected and put in working order before trying to use it. Dampness in electrical controls, carbonization of the electrodes, and clogging of chimney flues are common fire causes. Have your serviceman check the smoke box, stacks and chimney flues, as well as all electrical connections, fire-fighters suggest.
