

# Merchants Tie Series Sunday Reliefer Roberts Saves Game

Campbellville came back to tie the third best of three series with Galt when they defeated the Terriers 9-6 in Campbellville before a large hometown crowd on Sunday afternoon.

**Five Pitchers**  
Five pitchers saw action in the hard hitting contest with Jack Roberts emerging as the winner and Ken Lavis as the loser. Lavis and John Clarke for Galt gave up nine runs off 14 hits they walked two and struck out five.

Harry Hamilton started for Campbellville and was relieved with two on and none out in the third. Hamilton had pitched hitless ball and allowed but one unearned run, but was having a great deal of control trouble as he walked seven. Garry Field took over from Hamilton and allowed five runs off seven hits in three and one-third innings. He walked four and struck out five.

**Hurls Final Three**  
Jack Roberts, who hurled the final three and two-thirds innings for Campbellville was brilliant in relief as he shut out the Senior Inter-County League representatives with two hits. He hit one batter and struck out three. Roberts' effort was particularly noteworthy because he had pitched the whole game the previous day.

Campbellville picked up five hits in the first inning but were only able to score twice. Moore doubled, went to third on Wingrove's single and scored on Henderson's single to left. Cairns' single loaded the bases, but Joyce's grounder forced Wingrove at the plate. Elliott's single scored Henderson, but King grounded out with the bases loaded to end the threat.

**Unearned Run**

Comparing wages with those of 60 years ago, Mr. Featherstone noted that he received \$1 an hour for operating his threshing machine and that he paid a good helper \$1.25 a day, which was considered good money.

Mr. Featherstone includes among his hobbies the following of sports activities and also mentioned that he enjoyed the Milton steam show very much. "I saw many of the different types of machines I used to operate," he remarked.

He mentioned that prices and the cost of living have gone up tremendously in the past years and remembered when he could buy a dozen eggs for 10 cents, a pound of butter for eight cents and a pound of steak for 25 cents. Mr. Featherstone married twice

and has five children, Maud (Mrs. Lawrence), Frieda (Mrs. Jack Hunter), Sheldon, Leona (Mrs. Walter Fidler) and Jane Bell "Bud" (Mrs. K. Gunby).

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## Pre - School Training for Deaf Child Includes Home Visits, Group Clinics

A pre - school clinic for deaf children — designed to prepare the child more adequately for a more formal education after age five — is being launched this fall by officials of Ontario School for the Deaf, Milton.

D. E. Kennedy, superintendent of the new provincial school here, said the clinics were an experiment but he predicted a success even before the project was launched. Initial response from the parents concerned in proving the clinics will eventually fill a great need in the province, he said.

**First for Province**  
To date, pre-school clinics have never been conducted by the Provincial schools in Belleville or Milton. The Department of Education gave its stamp of approval to the Milton project that will serve hundreds of under-five-year-olds in the area west of Highway 400 and north to Georgian Bay.

Miss Juanita Fox, who has several years' experience in teaching deaf children in the junior school, was chosen to launch

the project. She took an intensive training course this past summer at the John Tracy Clinic, associated with the University of Southern California, Los Angeles.

She began to survey the western half of the province earlier this month, calling on homes of parents with pre-school deaf children to explain the service that is offered. Officials figure one teacher will not be enough to handle the work and more will be required in the near future.

**Group Clinics**  
Miss Fox is attempting to counsel the parents in their home on her regular visits, but where several children reside in an area, she has been authorized to set up a regular clinic where mothers and fathers can bring their child. One such clinic is being organized at the Milton school, with at least a half dozen children in the Milton - Georgetown - Acton - Hamilton area already enrolled. Such group clinics will allow the teacher more time with each child.

Parents can teach

"Miss Fox is prepared to assist parents by giving advice and by actual demonstrations with the child, on ways the parents and other members of the family can teach them the things that normal children ordinarily learn day to day," the superintendent said.

There is no age limit, he added, for children can be accepted as soon as the parents realize there is a hearing problem in the child. "It is never too early," he adds.

### GUEST SPEAKER
