Study on Formosa

Mrs. Lloyd McDougall was in charge of the Study Book and gave a very interesting study on the first portion of Taiwan or Formosa. Mrs. McDougall with the use of a map gave an interesting talk on its situation, just off the coast of China proper, a fertile semi-tropical island 250 miles long. It is the seat of government of the Republic of China. The economy of Taiwan was briefly discussed, the lowlands produce abundant rice and vegetable crops, while sugar, pineapple and other agricultural products are exported. The economy is rapidly shifting from agriculture to industry. Further study will be made as to the missionary work of the Presbyterian Church in Formosa which has 170,000 adherents.

The Church in Formosa is self-governing and is a member of the World Council of Churches. Dr. George Leslie Mackay of the Presbyterian Church in Canada was one of the first missionaries to arrive in Tamsui in 1872. With this interesting introduction on "Formosa the Beautiful" members are looking forward to further study.

The meeting closed with the singing of hymn 492 "O Thou who camest from above", and all repeating the Mizpah benediction.

Mrs. H. Magee and Mrs. Hellie Anderson were in charge of the social period that followed, when all enjoyed coffee and refreshments.

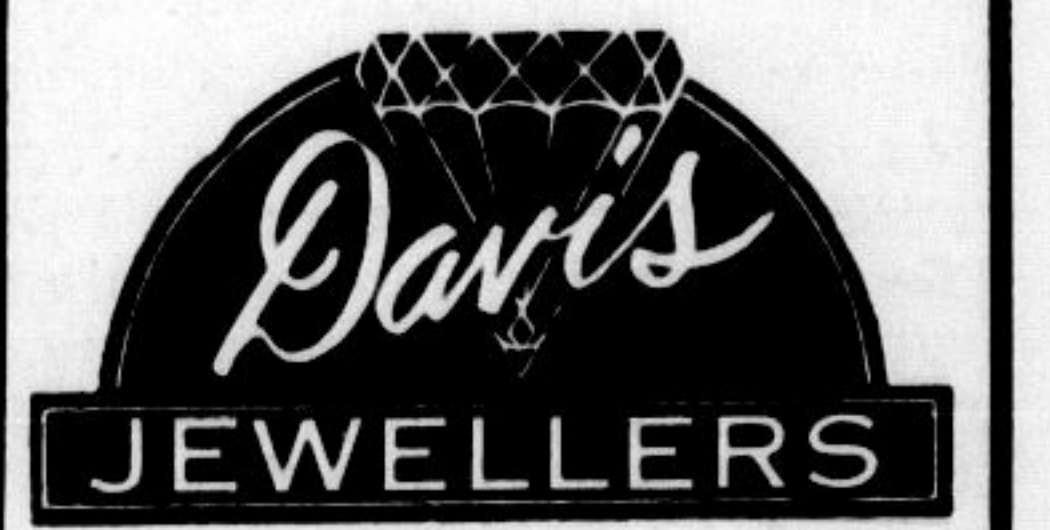

Photography Tips

Close in for Close-Up Shots

The best informal pictures of children are often taken when many parents would least expect the situation to yield exceptional snapshot opportunities. Looking at photos of this sort, whether it's an experiment in junior science or merely a favorite pastime, one would sometimes assume that the photography is the work of a professional with special training in posing children at work or play.

But this is not so. Wonderful pictures of children are usually achieved by spending a great deal of time with them. For most parents this is not only easy but virtually inescapable.

Right Place, Time

To catch those wonderful picture opportunities you must have your camera in the right place at the right time. This will mean that you can take advantage of those situations which in the past may have evoked a vain, "Wouldn't that make a cute snapshot."

When children are engrossed in their juvenile activities move in with the camera as close as you possibly can without amputating an important part of the picture. Let's say that the reason for a picture is entirely concentrated on a child's face. The child may be sniffing a flower, blowing bubbles or reacting to a new food. The likeliest place for your camera to be is just as close as it is capable of making a sharp picture. With a box type camera, this distance is around six feet but slip an inexpensive close-up attachment over the lens and the distance shifts to a more desirable three and one-half feet.

Stay Well Back

When the picture situation depends upon what the entire child is up to, step back so that you can see the entire child in your view-finder. If there is any chance that your busy subject might change position, back up an extra foot or two to allow a safety zone.

Snapshots of children can be close and sharp and still leave lots of room for improvement. When shooting pictures of children be sure to keep the camera down at their level, even, if it means bending, kneeling, stopping, squatting or sprawling.
