

Reject Per Capita Charge Basis For County Manor Sewage Service

An outstanding account for sewage service to Halton Centennial Manor, dating back to 1960, appeared no nearer settlement after Milton Council rejected a payment formula based on the number of occupants.

Prior to the latest manor addition the service was paid on the basis of the hypothetical assessment of the Manor. With the addition the assessment doubled and with it the bill for sewage service. The Manor Board objected, as the first agreement covering the service expired. No new formula has been developed that is satisfactory to both the Board and the town council.

sewage system is approximately \$6.38, Councillor Pearce observed but it would vary from year to year.

Councillor C. Menefy objected to applying the per capita formula to 1960.

Councillor C. Johnson noted the Manor Board would not accept the same charges for water as were paid by the O.S.D. yet they wanted the same sewage rate.

Deputy Reeve J. Bell suggested, until a proper agreement is signed with the Manor Board, they should pay on the basis of the former agreement.

Council Rejects

Monday night councillor N. Pearce introduced a motion that would offer the service on the same basis as a present agreement with the Ontario School for the Deaf. This was rejected by Council on a recorded vote.

In submitting the formula Councillor Pearce explained the Manor Board had paid \$1171 annually for the service for three years and it was not questioned until the Manor was enlarged. The Ontario School for the Deaf is billed on a per capita cost of the operation of the system as worked out over the entire town. This cost is applied to the occupancy level of the school.

Same Formula

Councillor Pearce's motion sought to introduce the same formula for the Manor Board charges, with the understanding the whole program would be reviewed when the O.S.D. agreement expired.

Council defeated this motion but indicated it would support another motion applying to the sewer charges on county buildings on the basis of assessment as related to the number of mills included in the town's general rate for operation of the system.

Councillor C. Johnson objected to applying the terms of the O.S.D. contract to the Manor Board when the contract was not even drawn in 1960 when the Manor Board first became delinquent.

MILTON COUNCIL BRIEFS

Milton Council Monday:

- Referred to the water committee, a letter from Stanley Wilson applying for water at his property on lot 11 concession 2.
- Approved the purchase of the usual wreath for placing in November at the Cenotaph.
- Was assured by the Ontario Water Resources Commission that council's concern in the low flow of water in the Sixteen would be considered before granting further permits for taking water from the creek.
- Referred to the town's county council representatives, a suggestion from the Milton Chamber of Commerce that they should seek to have highway 25 proceed south from Palermo rather than along highway 25 and then south to Burlington.

HALTON COUNCIL BRIEFS

At the September meeting of Halton County Council on Thursday:

- A by-law authorizing all county roads to be declared "through highways" was ordered, following receipt from O.P.P. of a list of stop signs that are presently illegally erected.
- The engineer reported on plans to improve the intersection of Five Sideroad at the Nassagaweya-Esquesing Town Line, the scene of several recent accidents.
- A November date for the annual Warden's Dinner was discussed, but not finalized. Most councillors favored a banquet prior to municipal election time.
- Solicitors Sharpe and Nichols of Milton were retained as county solicitors, at \$1,000 per annum.
- The roads committee recommended that where good trees are destroyed in reconstruction of roads, the county should replace them with suitable trees.
- Council approved preparation of a by-law authorizing the county to assume control of the road between Milton Heights and the Kelso Conservation area.
- The engineer was asked to obtain prices on installing a flashing light at the Drumquin intersection on the Seventh Line, Oakville. This corner has also been the scene of several bad accidents in the past few years, and a coroner's jury inquiring into a recent fatality there, recommended a flashing light.

\$1,000 Damage Driver Injured

An accident on Mary St. Saturday evening caused \$1,000 damage to a car driven by Donald Keith Morley of Mary St. Mr. Morley's car, a '54 Meteor, skidded off the road and struck a tree. He was hospitalized with lacerations to the face, but was later released. The accident was one of three investigated by the Milton Police detachment during the week.

Saturday afternoon a car driven by Anne Bonehill of Kilbride struck a parked car owned by William Shepherd of R.R. 3, Milton, on Martin Street. Total damage was \$50.

Monday, the police investigated an accident involving Alfonso Crisci of Milton and Andy Trischler of Hornby. The accident occurred when Mr. Trischler was making a left hand turn from the Robin Hood Flour Mills onto Martin St. and Mr. Crisci was making a left hand turn from Mill St. onto Martin St. Damage was estimated at \$25 to each vehicle.

Ligny, Quatre Bras Schools Sold Bannockburn, Pinegrove are Pending

The future of two Esquesing Township one-room schools was decided Tuesday evening but sale of two others is pending further discussion with interested buyers.

Esquesing school board members agreed to sell the Ligny school to Scotch Block W.I. for a community hall at a price of \$3,000 and dispose of the Quatre Bras school to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Lendvay for a residence at a price of \$5,010.

Schools Closed

The one-room schools have been placed on the auction block after they were closed when Speyside, Limehouse and Pineview Central schools were built. Previously Blue Mountain and Limehouse one-room schools were sold. Hornby school is still for sale as board members refused to accept tenders received.

It was learned during the meeting in a letter from Esquesing Bus Company one of their drivers was no longer an employee.

Sues Authority On Land Deal

Milton Council was advised Monday that suit had been entered against the Parking Authority, an agency of the town, by Ken Jensen.

The suit involved an agreement on the purchase of property on Mill St.

The town agreed to enter an appeal and this was authorized by Council Monday.

Parking Authority Chairman S. Clark told The Champion the matter involved property on Mill St. which had been planned as part of the town's off-street parking program.

Show 12 Injured

North Halton O.P.P. and the Milton Police detachment investigated a total of 41 accidents during the month of September, with property damage totaling an estimated \$12,400. Twelve injuries resulted.

The O.P.P. investigated 28 accidents which resulted in property damage estimated at \$10,005, 10 injuries and no deaths.

The Milton police force investigated 13 accidents resulting in two injuries and \$2,395 property damage.
