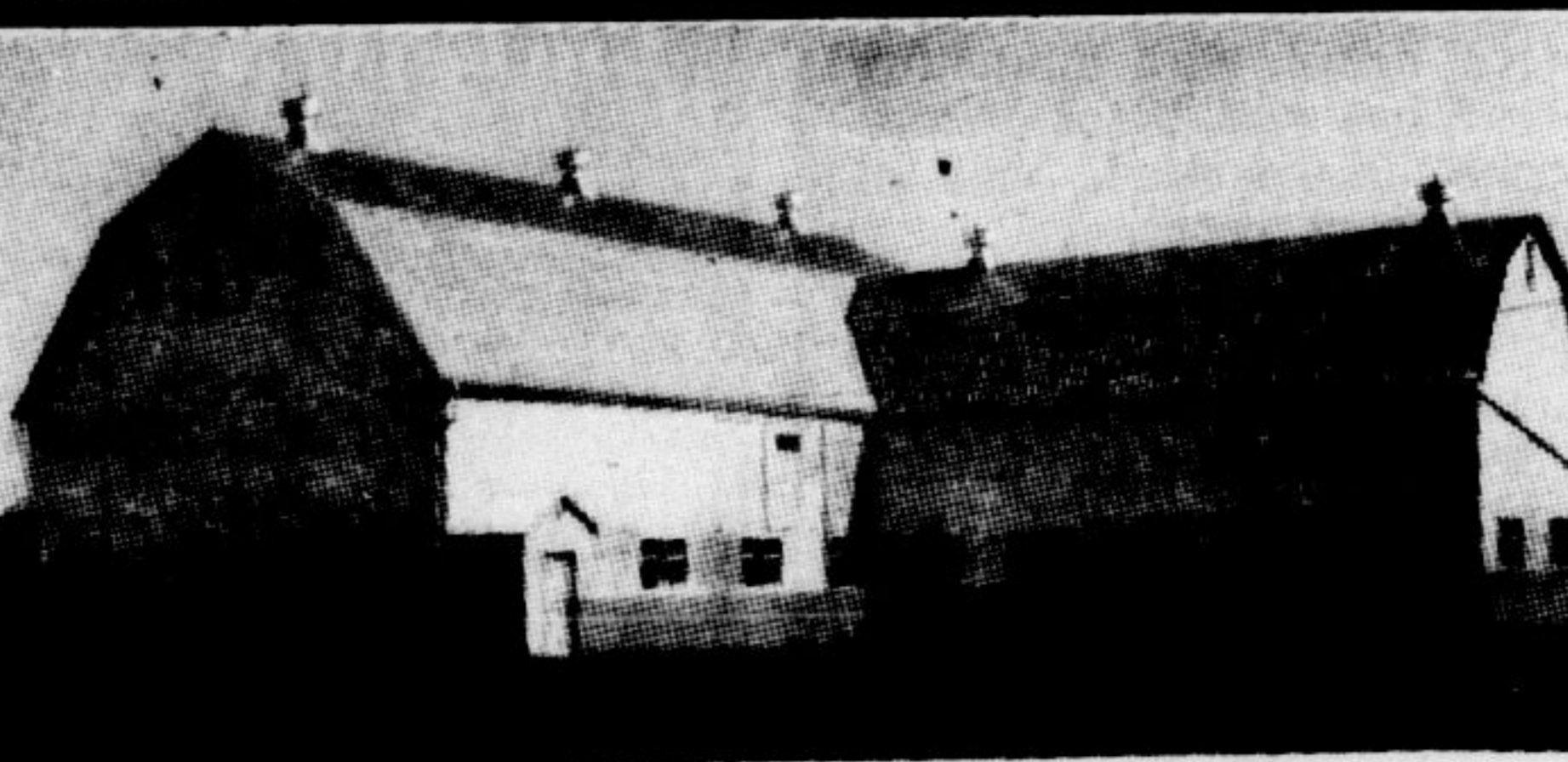
An Industrial Booth will provide specific and up-to-date information pertaining to the local municipalities within the County, and will have at hand, industrial data to assist industry on site selection.

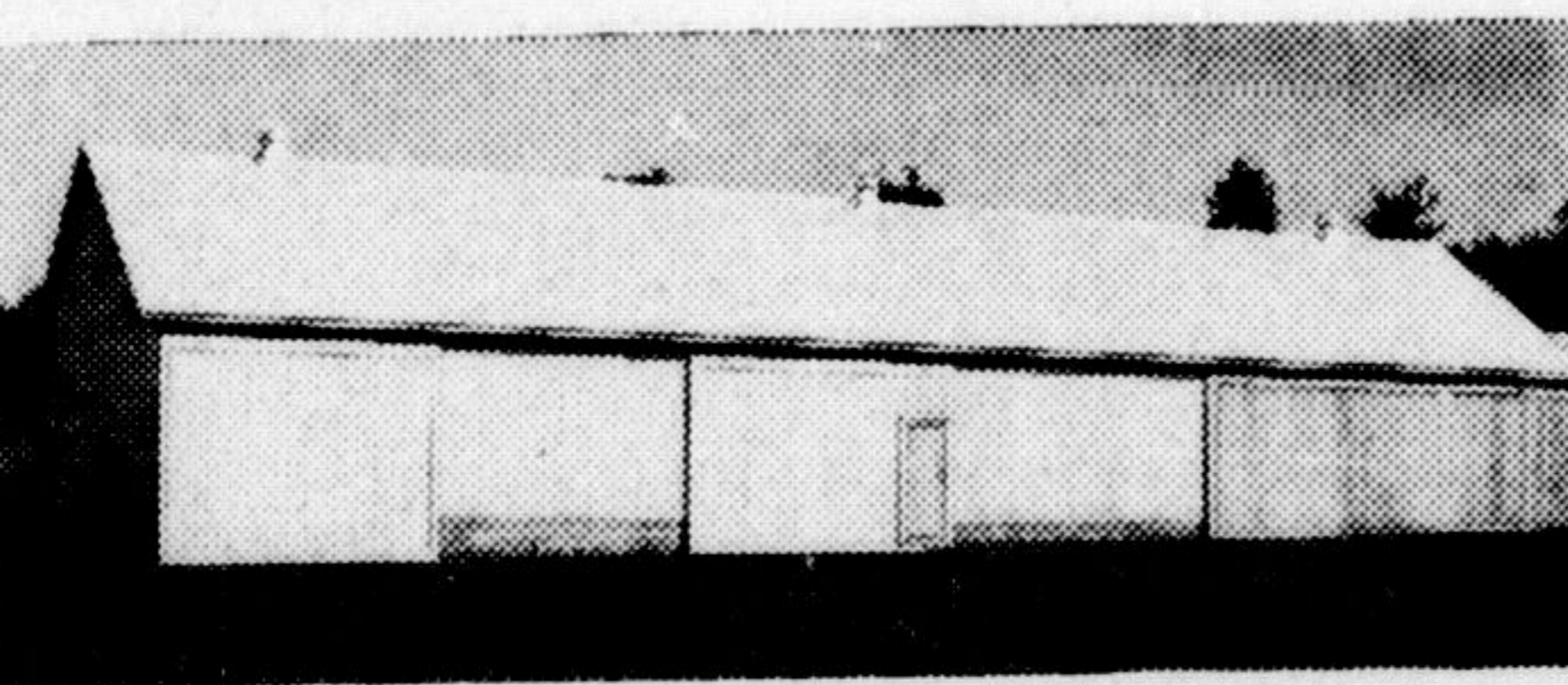


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
