

Potato Regulations Changed Sept 15

Special provisions in the grade regulations for early potatoes no longer apply, when the maturity and size requirements for late potatoes are in force.

The Farm Products Inspection Branch advises that Ontario No 1 Grade and Canada No 1 Grade for late potatoes require that potatoes be "fairly well matured". Not more than 20 per cent by weight of the individual potatoes in any lot may have more than 25 per cent of the skin missing or feathered. Ontario No. Grade requires that potatoes be "reasonably mature", meaning that not more than 10 per cent by weight of the individual potatoes in a lot may have more than 50 per cent of the skin missing or feathered.

Size requirements in Canada No. 1 Grade and Ontario No. 1 Grade vary. In Ontario No. 1 Grade potatoes, other than longshaped varieties, may not be less than two inches or more than three and a half inches, providat least 75 per cent of the potatoes by weight in any package are a minimum of two and a quarter inches in diameter.

For the same type of potatoes in Canada No. 1 Grade, the minimum size is two and a quarter inches and maximum three and a half inches diameter in containers of 25 pounds or less, Show, held Saturday at Milton two thirds; and Fred Nurse of while above the 25 pound pack-Georgetown had a second place age size, the maximum size may be four inches in diameter.
