

Record 170-Head Entry

Leaver, Ashville Best in Holsteins

A record 170 head of Holsteins (up 42 from last year) were entered in Milton Fair's annual Halton County black and white show Saturday.

George and L. H. Leaver of Campbellville were named premier exhibitors, while Ashville Farms Ltd. of R.R. 6, Milton, topped the premier breeder award.

Leavers showed the reserve senior champion female, reserve grand champion female, and senior and grand champion males of the show. Ashville showed the senior champion female, grand champion female, and reserve junior champion. Leavers had five firsts, four seconds and two thirds in the show, while Ashville had five firsts, three seconds and two thirds.

Novel Entry

T. H. McGee of R.R. 1, Norval exhibited the junior and reserve junior champion females, while Gordon Sinclair and Sons of R.R. 1, Burlington, showed the junior champion male and the reserve grand champion male.

The afternoon judging was sponsored by the Halton Holstein Breeders' Club in co-operation with the Halton Agricultural Society, the Holstein-Friesian Association of Brantford, and the Live Stock Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture. It was described as an "excellent" show, with as many as 22 entries in some of the 24 classes on the program.

Streetsville, Erin Breeders Sell Livestock to Japan Gov't

Tom Hays, of Hays Farms International, Oakville, has just shipped to Japan two plane loads of top Canadian and U.S.A. Holsteins, totalling 35 head in all. This is the first direct flight of livestock to Japan from Canada.

These were selected by an 11-man Japanese group of livestock and government officials headed by Dr. Yushiro Kusachi, Executive Secretary of the Hokkaido Holstein Agricultural Co-operative Association, Sapporo, Hokkaido. All but one of the animals were bought by the Association, one going to Fukushima Livestock Breeding Station, Fukushima-Ken, Japan.

Improve Quality

Dr. Kusachi stated that these richly bred cattle were intended to improve the quality of Japanese Holsteins on the north island of Hokkaido.

The fifteen Canadian Holsteins included five cows, seven beef heifers and three heifer calves. Five head were from Spring Farms, Streetsville; four from R. R. Dennis, Oak Ridges; four from Glenafon Farms, Alliston; and two from C. J. Cersell, Beeton, Ontario.

Also included in the shipment for the Government of Hokkaido were four Lacombe pigs, a boar and three sows, all from Harold Meek, Erin, Ontario.

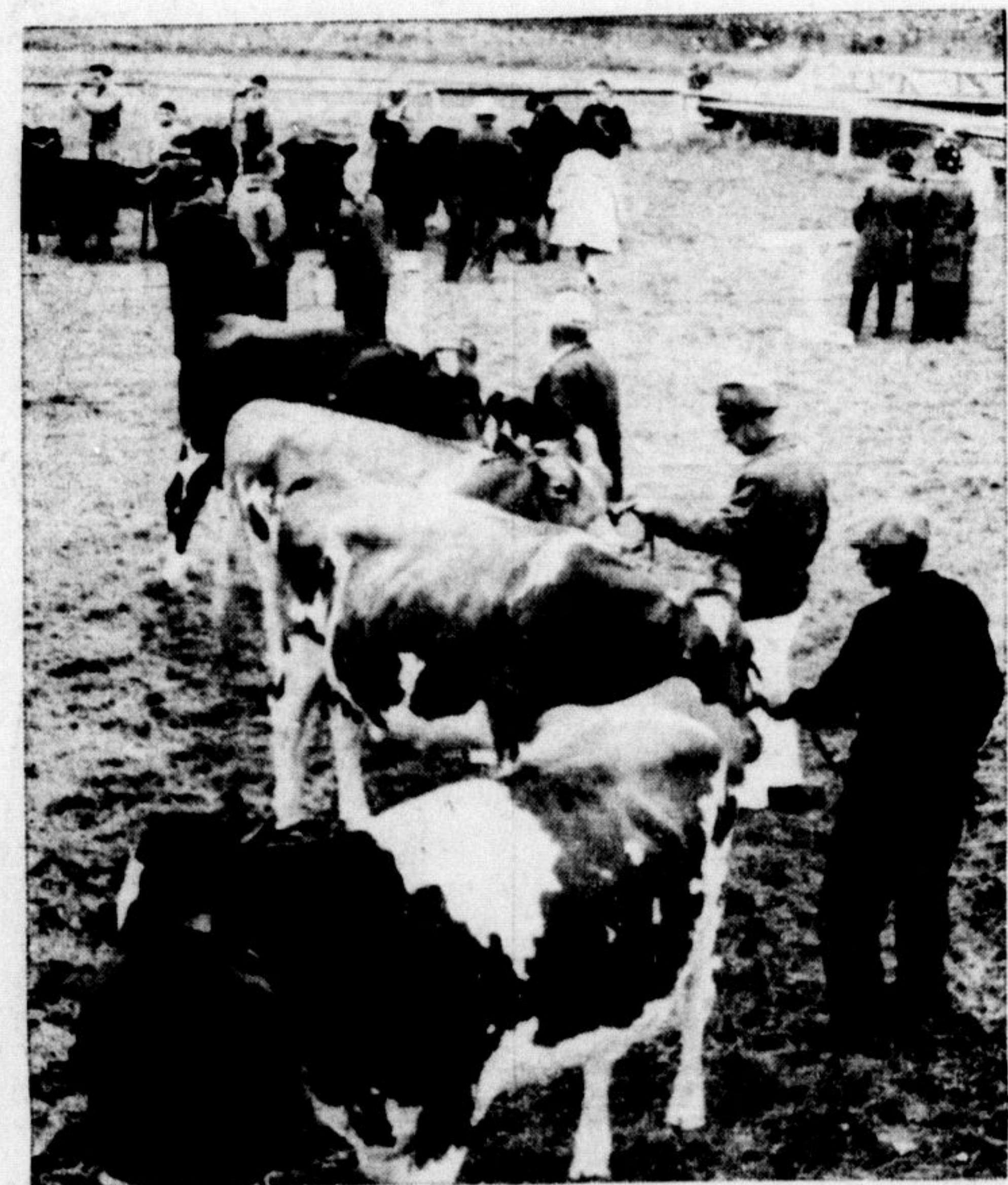

Potato Regulations Changed Sept 15

Special provisions in the grade regulations for early potatoes no longer apply, when the maturity and size requirements for late potatoes are in force.

The Farm Products Inspection Branch advises that Ontario No 1 Grade and Canada No 1 Grade for late potatoes require that potatoes be "fairly well matured". Not more than 20 per cent by weight of the individual potatoes in any lot may have more than 25 per cent of the skin missing or feathered. Ontario No. 2 Grade requires that potatoes be "reasonably mature", meaning that not more than 10 per cent by weight of the individual potatoes in a lot may have more than 50 per cent of the skin missing or feathered.

Size requirements in Canada No. 1 Grade and Ontario No. 1 Grade vary. In Ontario No. 1 Grade potatoes, other than long-shaped varieties, may not be less than two inches or more than three and a half inches, providing at least 75 per cent of the potatoes by weight in any package are a minimum of two and a quarter inches in diameter.

For the same type of potatoes in Canada No. 1 Grade, the minimum size is two and a quarter inches and maximum three and a half inches diameter in containers of 25 pounds or less, while above the 25 pound package size, the maximum size may be four inches in diameter.

Jersey Show Entrant M. C. Beaty Is Premier Breeder, Exhibitor

Maurice C. Beaty of Milton was premier breeder and exhibitor in the Halton Jersey Cattle Show, held Saturday at Milton Fair.

He showed the junior champion male, reserve grand champion male, reserve junior champion female, senior champion female, and grand champion female in the show, as well as winning nine firsts, four seconds, and three thirds.

Mac Alexander and Sons of Norval showed the reserve junior champion male, senior champion male, grand champion male, reserve senior champion female, and reserve grand champion female. They also won five firsts, five seconds and five thirds.

Featherstone Bros., Oakville, had the junior champion female as well as three firsts and two thirds; Ken Ella and Sons of

Hornby showed five seconds and three thirds; Ernest M. Davies of Guelph had a first, a second and two thirds; and Fred Nurse of Georgetown had a second place win.
