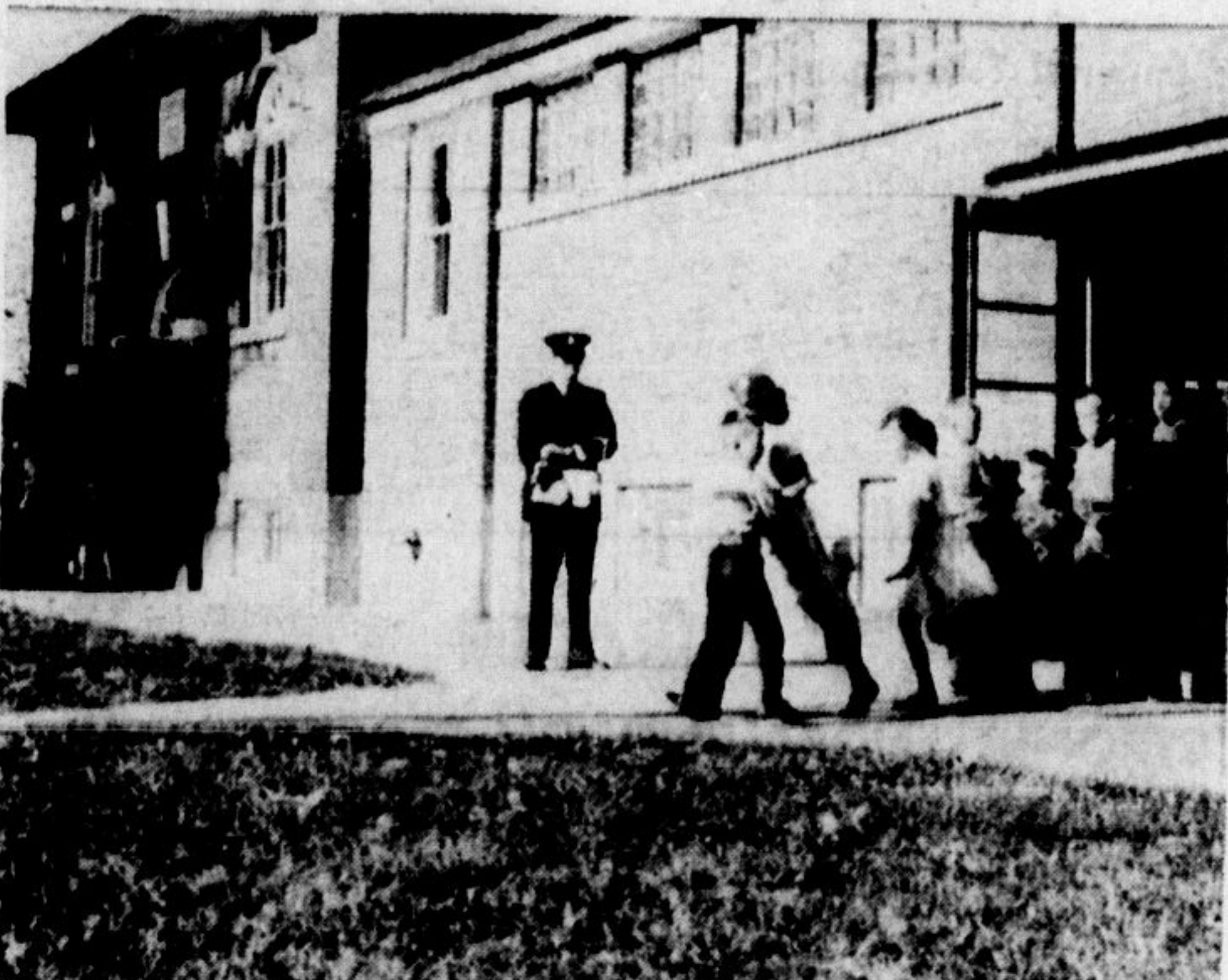

**Denies Conflict of Interest**

A hint there might be a conflict of interest involving Georgetown Deputy-Reeve W. J. Hunter, drew a scornful denial and a demand for an apology at the October meeting of Halton County Council.

But Reeve F. I. Ryckman of Burlington, who made the allegation during a council meeting over a month ago, neither refused nor granted the apology. He had to leave Thursday's meeting early and wasn't in his seat when the official request for an apology was presented.

At the earlier meeting, Reeve Ryckman wondered if there was a possible conflict of interest between the Georgetown councillor

and the county, involving the sale of land to house a tri-county jail building. The Council had jotted various proposed sites, and Reeve Ryckman thought he saw one of Mr. Hunter's real estate firm's signs on one property.

At the time, Deputy-Reeve Hunter denied the allegation. He renewed his denial Thursday, suggested the statement was "uncalled for" and asked for an apology.

Warden C. A. Martin referred to procedural rules and suggested the Deputy-Reeve present his request later in the meeting, when the minutes of that meeting were dealt with.

**Delay Line Use Waiting Permit**

A three month delay in the use of primary cables from Martin St. across the C.P.R. lines will be necessary despite the fact that the job has been completed, Milton Hydro Electric commissioners learned when they met Tuesday of last week.

While the primary cables are already across the C.P.R. line, they will not be able to be put in use until a necessary permit has been received. The three month delay is the usual period of time taken for the issuance of such a permit.

The primary cables are being erected because they are stronger than other types of cable presently in use in the town.

It was also learned at the meeting that the two truck employees, Ed Ramsbottom and Len Ste. Marie, have been taking the aerial basket safety course.

The commission sponsored a motion to the Ontario Municipal Electric Association which suggested, "a central control clearing place for all hard-to-collect hydro accounts should be established."

It was agreed that the commission continue its sponsorship of public speaking contests in the Milton elementary and high schools.

The commissioners were advised that the assessment for the local Hydro office had been increased \$1,750 due to the alterations and refurbishings done at the office recently.

Commissioners approved expenses totaling \$98,249.49, incurred during the last three months.

**Neighbours Save Norval Home**

Quick action by two neighbors saved a Norval district home from catching fire Sunday noon, when a nearby tool shed burned to the ground.

Alexander Kudrasovs and an unidentified man wetted the roof with water from a garden hose when flames from the shed threatened the home of Harold Collins, market gardener at R.R. 2, Norval. Mr. Collins estimated the loss at \$500. He did not know how the fire started.

He had left to visit friends in Galt about an hour and a half before the smoke was seen by neighboring youngsters. The fire was reported to Georgetown Fire Department by Mrs. Arnold Lappe, but the building was levelled when the volunteer brigade arrived.

"If the neighbors had not acted, the house would have gone, too," Mr. Collins said.

Mr. Collins' daughter, Mrs. Douglas Arnold of Springbrook, managed to notify him in Galt. She did not know the name of the person he was visiting, but remembered Mr. Collins had met him during a C.P.R. tour last fall. She called Claude McLaughlin, who had also taken the tour, and he was able to recall the name.

Hunter wondered if other councillors on that tour had seen any of his real estate signs, and all of them—Warden Martin, Reeve John Elliott of Georgetown, and Reeve H. H. Hinton of Acton—reported they saw no such signs.
