town had done the exploration and testing work in the area. "If the Authority grants rights to others to use the water, they should reimburse the town a percentage of the exploration and testing costs," he suggested.
"No one will be allowed to take water but a contributing municipality. As primary takers we will be in a good position," Reeve Martin suggested. Member municipalities of the Authority are Milton, Oakville, Esquering and Nassagaweya.

Go for This
"The best solution is to go for this additional clause. It's not ideal but it will resolve the situation," Councillor Pearce suggested.
In earlier discussions on the agreement, the town had sought exclusive rights to the ground water supply. During the recent annexation hearing, evidence given by J. Kirk of International Water Supply indicated there was a million and a half gallons daily in the ground water supply. The town presently has a pumping capacity of a million gallons daily
