An Open Letter to the School Board of Esquesing No. 1

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Board:
On October 15 we delivered to your secretary, a letter which you apparently choose to ignore. We respectfully point out that when a question is placed before a school board, common courtesy demands that ratepayers receive an answer.

Again we call to your attention that seven weeks of the school year have now elapsed and

to date you have not taken the action necessary to return our children to Speyside School, the school which was built to place children from our area in a graded situation.

The situation which we viewed as serious in September is now alarming. The results we anticipated from your action have occurred. Hence, our inspector, Mr. McDowell has twice advised you, in writing, to return our children to their rightful school.

Here are our questions: Why do you refuse to follow the advice of Mr. McDowell, the person best qualified by education, training and experience to know what is best for our children? Do you not trust Mr. McDowell for an impartial judgment of the situation?

If you continue to refuse to act upon the advice of Mr. McDowell who speaks for the Department of Education, we can only conclude that indeed discrimination against our children and ourselves is your only motive. There can be no other interpretation placed on the sequence of events which have occurred since August 26 when you decided to move some Waterloo section pupils.

When a board arrogantly refuses to answer ratepayers, it would appear that it considers the electorate an unnecessary adjunct to the democratic system.

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No Solution On Ontario St. Sidewalk Plan

Whether or not a sidewalk will be contracted on the west side of Ontario St. from below Parkway Dr. to Main St. was no closer to a solution, after Milton Council reviewed the project Monday.

The clerk told council a representative of the Department of Public Works had telephoned to advise the Department would pay 50 per cent of the cost of the sidewalk that would serve pupils from the Ontario School for the Deaf, as well as residents in the area.

Earlier council had asked the Department to bear 90 per cent of the cost of the sidewalk estimated at \$7,360. A gravelled path already exists along the west side of Ontario St. to Pine St.

Deputy Reeve J. Bell suggested council couldn't charge for sidewalks in the Fallingbrook area on a local improvement basis and then levy an Ontario St. sidewalk over the general rate of the town.

Councillor N. Pearce noted a sidewalk had been built along Martin St. for safety reasons. He agreed it was not an elaborate one, but it made walking considerably safer.

The matter was referred to the streets and walks committee with council indicating the offer was not in writing, and could not be considered a reply to their earlier suggestion of 90 per cent payment by the Department.
