### RIGHT AROUND HOME

Everyone finds at some time or other that the food budget needs stretching. Many economical dishes can be made from basic ingredients which are usually kept on hand.

For a meatless "meat loaf" try this nourishing cheese and rice loaf served with mushroom sauce. It bakes like a meat loaf, looks like a meat loaf and is just as satisfying and nourishing as one too.

**CHEESE-RICE LOAF**  
1/4 cup butter or margarine

- 1 cup milk
- 2 cups cooked rice
- 1 1/2 cups grated sharp cheese
- 1/2 cup fine dry bread crumbs
- 3 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1/4 cup minced onion
- 1 tablespoon dehydrated parsley
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 tablespoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon prepared mustard

**Sauce**

- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 3/4 cup water
- 1 can (3 or 4 oz.) sliced mushrooms

1. Heat butter with milk until melted.
2. Add rice, cheese and crumbs to eggs; stir in hot milk.
3. Add celery, onion, parsley, green pepper, and seasonings.
4. Turn into a greased loaf pan, 8 1/4 x 4 1/4 inches, that has been lined in bottom with greased unglazed paper.
5. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour and 15 minutes.
6. Unmold on serving platter and accompany with hot sauce made by blending soup with water until smooth and then heating through with canned mushrooms and broth.

Yield: Six servings.

Another loaf which those who are vegetarian in their habits will enjoy as a meat substitute dish is this peanut-cheese loaf. Rich in protein, it can be serv-

ed hot with either mushroom or tomato sauce.

**PEANUT-CHEESE LOAF**

- 1 cup cooked oatmeal, wheat cereal or rice
- 1/4 cup finely chopped green pepper
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 2 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 1/2 cups chopped salted peanuts
- 1 cup dry bread crumbs
- 1 1/2 cups grated cheese (about 6 ounces)
- 1 egg
- 1 cup milk

1. Combine all ingredients.
2. Bake in greased loaf pan at 350 degrees F (moderate oven) for about one hour.
3. Serve hot with mushroom or tomato soup diluted slightly into sauce.
