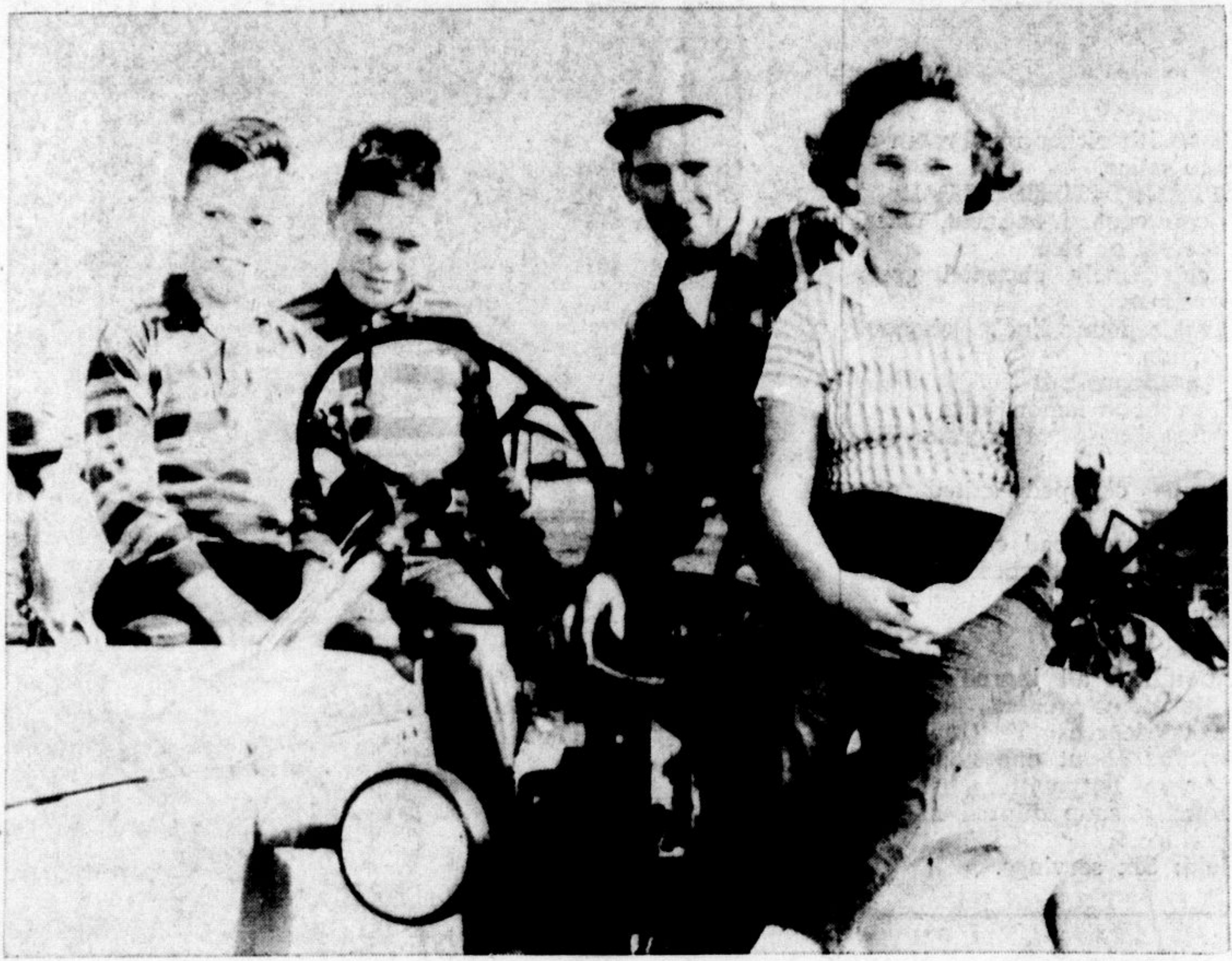

Top Price \$10,000 For Holstein Sale

Two artificial breeding units combined to pay the top price of \$10,000 at the 21st Annual All-Canadian Holstein sale held October 21 at Oakville. This was for a three months old bull calf, Glenafton Herdmaster, consigned by Glenafton Farms, Alliston. The joint buyers were the Central Ontario Cattle Breeding Association at Maple and the Waterloo Cattle Breeding Association at Waterloo. Herdmaster has his 14 nearest ancestors classified "Excellent" and his four nearest dams in the material line have produced at least 22,000 lbs. of milk in a year, making him unique amongst bulls in Canada in this respect.

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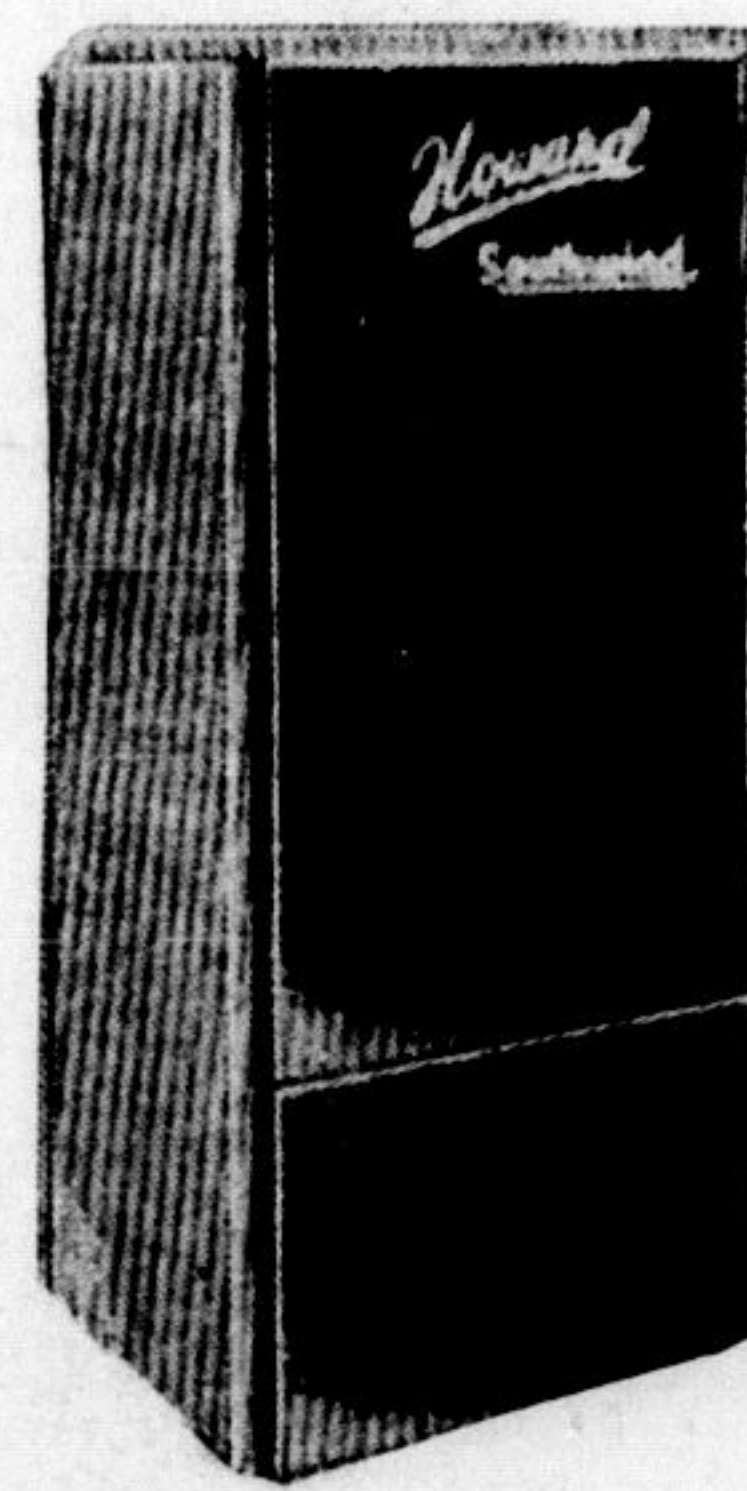
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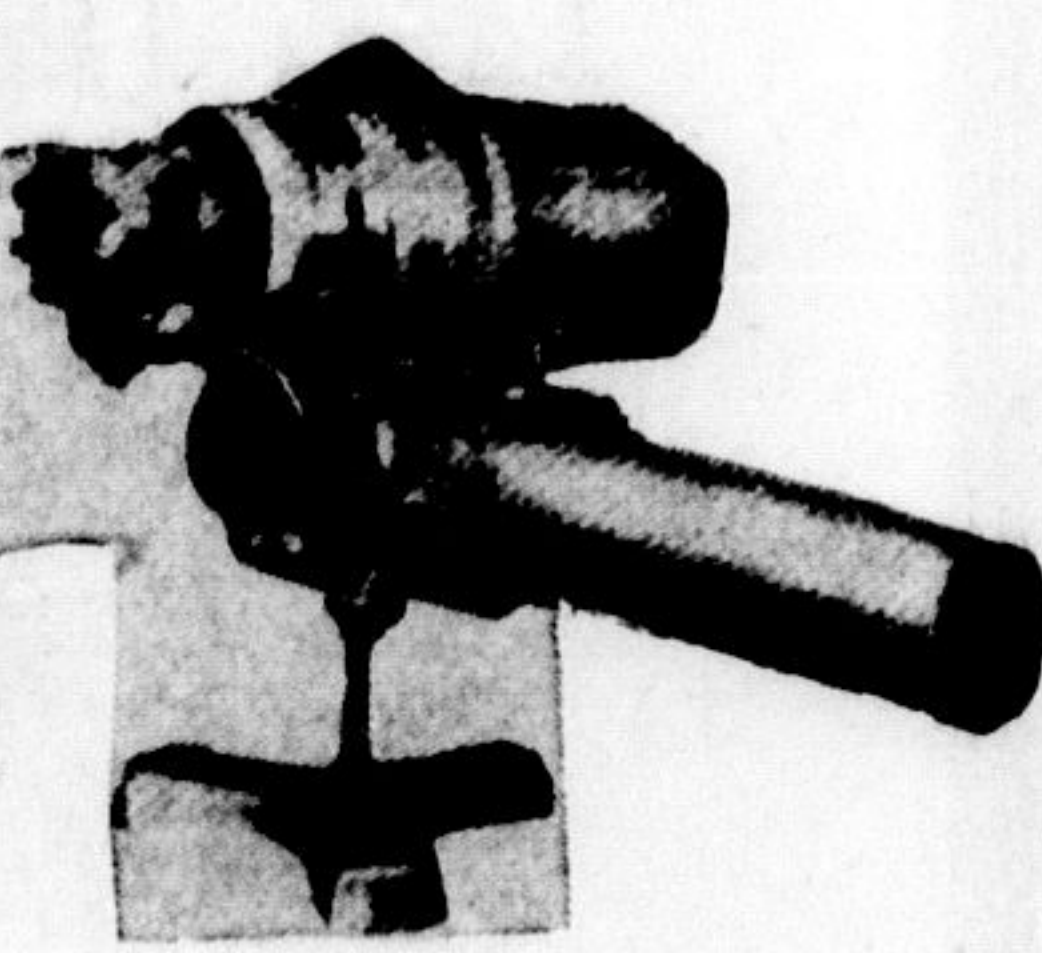
