The Milton Mustangs captured their fourth consecutive win of the season last Thursday when they travelled to Acton and trounced their hosts 31-6 in a regularly scheduled league game. Quarterback Rick Rowley led the Mustang offense, tossing three touchdown passes.

Trevor Houston caught the first touchdown toss in the first quarter and Pete McDuffe boot-ed the convert, to give the Mustangs a 7-0 lead. Rick Boothby accounted for the locals' second touchdown, plunging five yards through the middle. The convert attempt was no good.

In the second half, Georgetown scored their first goal and tied the score. Later, Georgetown scored another goal from a scramble around the goal and led the game 2-1. Milton, desperate to score another goal, played an extra man on the forward line, which proved to be a smart move, as Wayne Densmore scored from Brooks, to tie the game 2-2.

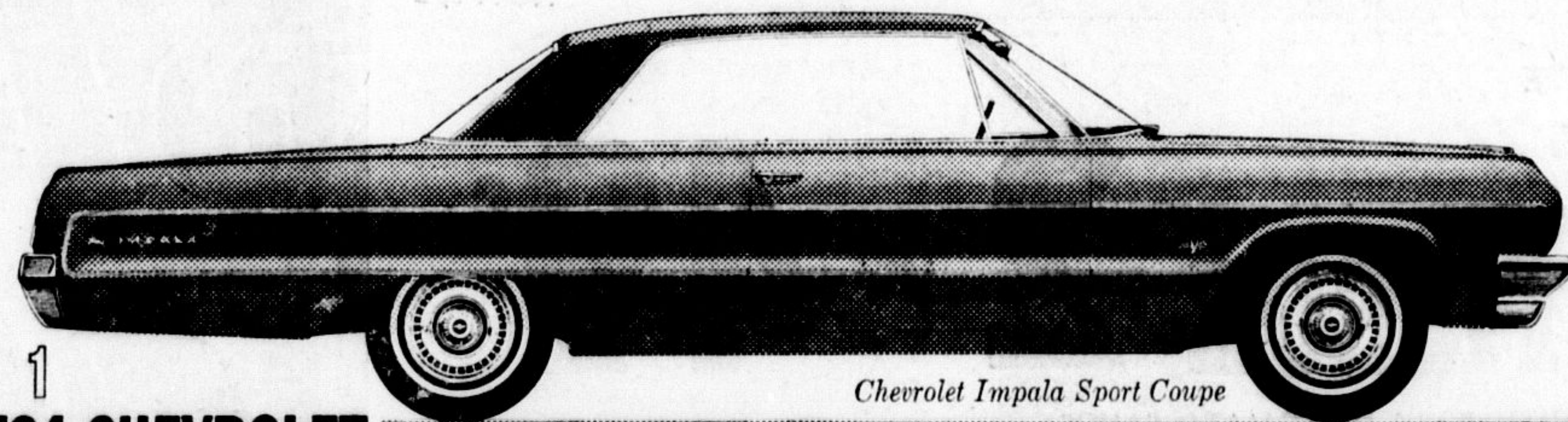
- very young children be accompanied by adults,

### TAXES ON VEHICLES

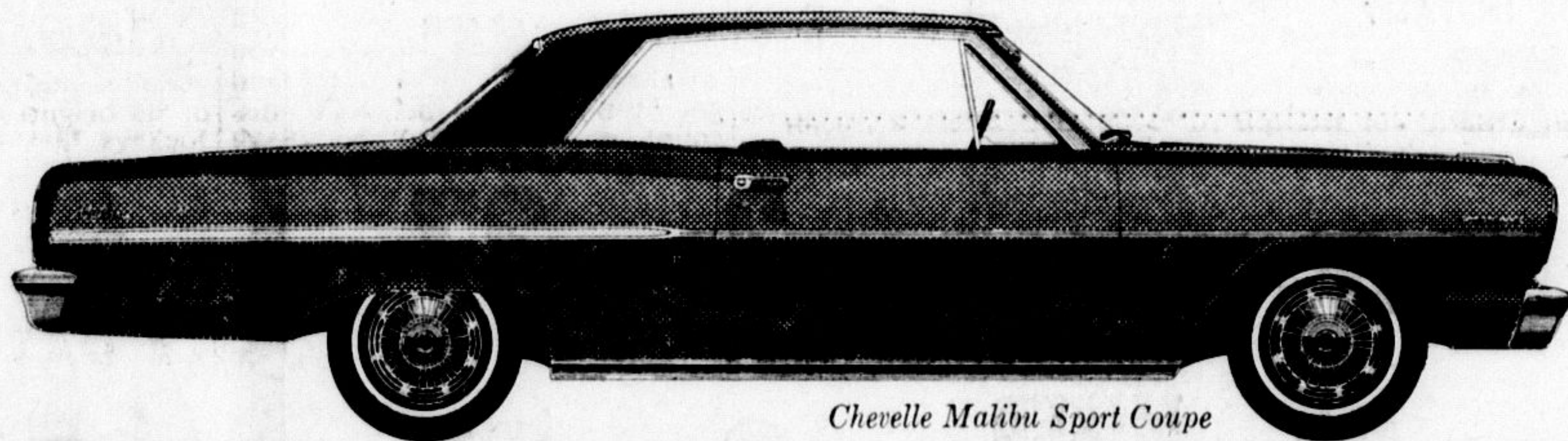

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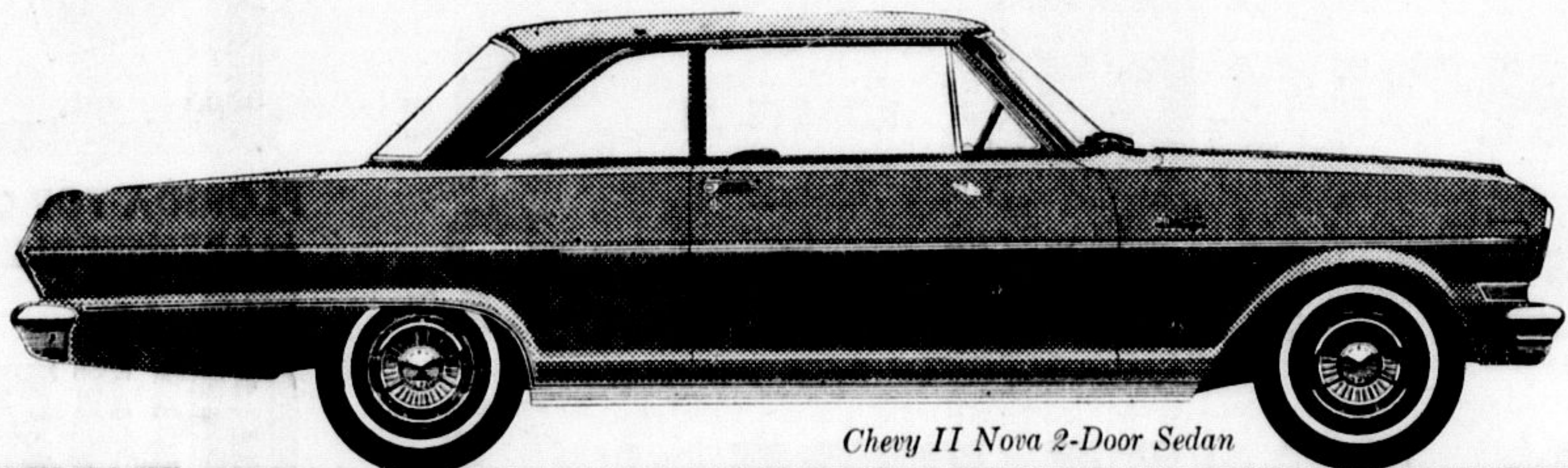
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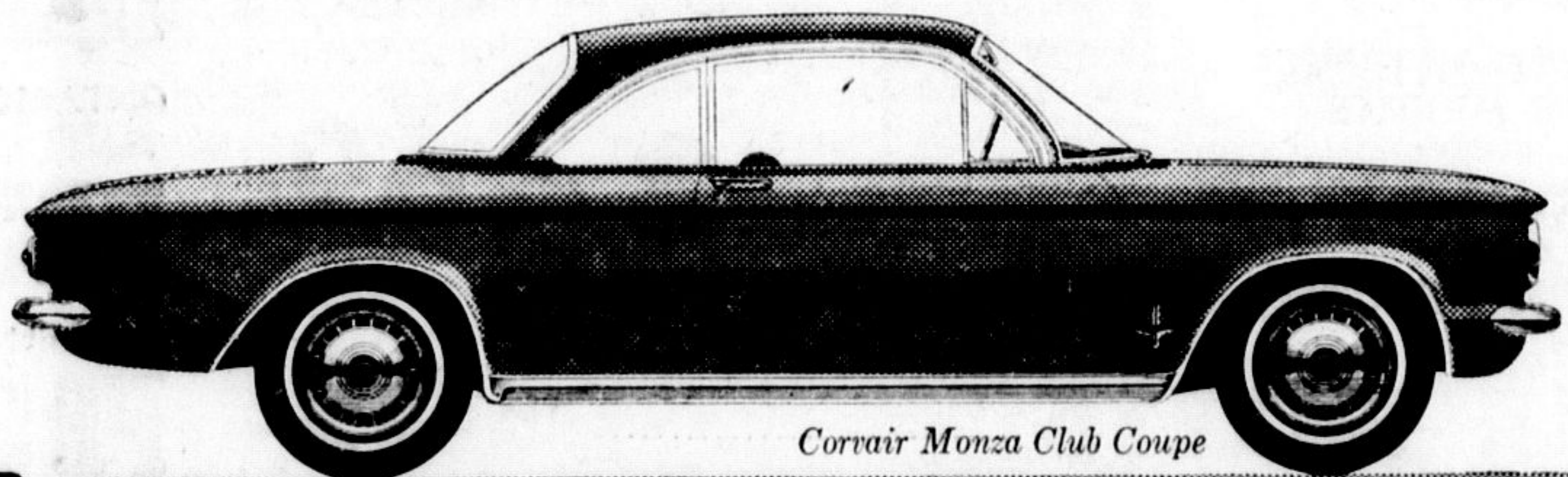
