He is moving to the diocese of West Kansas in the U.S.A., where he will be archdeacon and administrative assistant to the Bishop. Although his friends at the Manor will miss him very much, nevertheless they rejoice in the wonderful experience that he will be enjoying.

After reading Psalm 46 and part of chapter 1 of First Corinthians, Mr. Powell delivered a sermon completely in keeping with the occasion. He chose as his text, verse 4 of the above chapter, which begins with the words, "I thank my God always on your behalf."

Mr. Powell spoke first of the

many happy memories he has gathered at the Manor during the last eight years and wished the residents and staff every blessing. He said that he would look forward to seeing them when he returns to Canada on vacation.

Turning to his text, Mr. Powell said that it contained words of great joy from the pen of the Apostle Paul. Paul had spent some time in establishing the Christian church in Corinth and this epistle expresses great hope in connection with the work of the Christians there. This letter is applicable to Christians in our own day for it teaches us that although on some days we may fail, still we fail only in part and that today's difficulties may be the way to tomorrow's victories.

There was a very pleasant finale to the service when Mrs. A. Cumming recited a very fitting poem of appreciation to Mr. Powell and Mrs. Emily Hills, acting on behalf of his many friends among the residents and on the staff of the Manor presented to him a gold wrist watch and a set of pearl-studded tie clip and cuff-links as a mark of the great affection and respect in which he is held at the Manor. Although taken completely by surprise, Mr. Powell expressed thanks for the gifts which would be a constant reminder of his friends at the Manor.

Forty-one members of Milton and District Horticultural Society left Milton by bus on Friday, October 11. This was the annual three-day sight-seeing trip. They went to Quebec City via Kingsford and Montreal where overnight stops were made.

The tour of Quebec City was very interesting as they viewed such historic sights as Wolfe's Cove and Plains of Abraham where the famous battle which decided Canada's fate was fought in 1759. Part of Quebec still has stone ramparts and, of the original 17 gates across the Streets, three remain.

narrow farms with the farm buildings built close to the roadway.

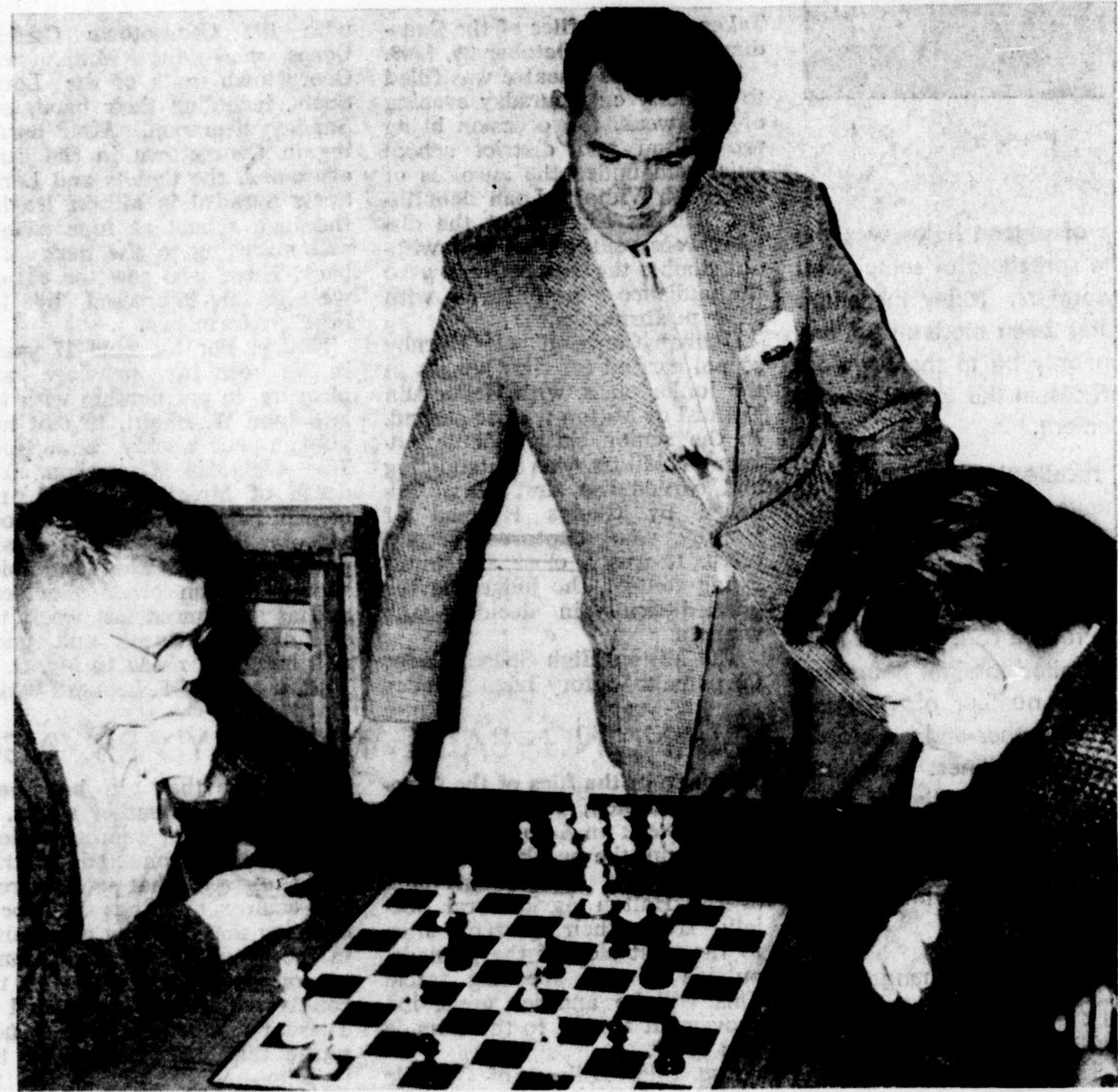

IS YOUR NAME ON THE 1963 VOTERS' LIST?

(FINAL DATE FOR APPEAL - NOVEMBER 8th, 1963)

To be qualified to vote at Municipal Elections, you must be 21 years of age; a British Subject; an Owner or Tenant, or Wife or Husband of an Owner or Tenant, and your name must be on the Voters' List, or added thereto by an appeal made within the time above mentioned. Those who occupy a domestic establishment of two or more rooms in which they sleep, prepare and serve meals and qualify as above are ENTITLED TO VOTE. ROOMERS and BOARDERS are NOT entitled to vote.

In case of omissions or corrections, enquiries may be made by telephoning or attending at the Town Clerk's Office, Town Hall, Milton.

To determine if your name is on the Voters' List correctly, check the Lists posted at the Town Hall or Post Office.

IF YOU HAVE CHANGED YOUR PLACE OF RESIDENCE THIS YEAR, PLEASE CHECK NOW TO ASCERTAIN THAT YOUR NAME IS PROPERLY SHOWN ON THE VOTERS' LIST.
