### HALTON SPORTSMEN

Saturday, December 21 saw one of the best crowds we have had in the last few years turn out for the Halton Sportsmen's Christmas Turkey Shoot, held at the Gord Lee Farm, Hornby. Two good fires kept the chill off most of the contestants and they stayed until near dark. Keen shooting at trap and target kept the boys busy.

Thirty-one turkeys were taken home by the lucky contenders. We can't remember all the names, but some of them are Wayne Pickett, Don Kearney, Ray Powell, Ricky Downs, Jamie Coulson, Maurice Coulson, Bob Schilling and John Readhead, just to name a few.

For those of us who are planning to put a hut on Lake Simcoe this year, remember the name of the owner must be put on the hut, along with the address. Huts that are not off the ice by a certain date will be removed by an official of the department and the costs charged to the owner. There is also a law which states no refuse such as bottles, cans, wood, etc. can be left on the ice or put down the ice fishing hole.

This is an excellent idea as there are sometimes 4,000 huts on the lake. Could you imagine the litter that the cottagers would have to put up with each spring, as it is washed ashore to private beaches and docks? The cottage owners, after all, pay enough taxes to demand a little consideration from fishermen. We have been told by the Cottage Owners' Association, Hotel Keepers and private catering services that unless the untidiness ceases they are going to have a petition taken to have Simcoe closed to ice fishing. This has happened to many other lakes up north, so please fellows, let's co-operate so we can enjoy this off-season fishing.

The fine fall of snow has made it first rate for a lot of cottontail and jack rabbit hunting over the holiday season. A few from around Milton are planning a trip a little farther north to some of the swamps for some snowshoe rabbit hunting. This little cousin of our jack rabbit makes fine shooting and a tasty morsel in the pot.

This recipe for snowshoe rabbit was tried in the Parry Sound district last year at the Tom Ramshaw cottage. Tom, his two sons Chris and Tom, Henry Ramshaw and myself took two rabbits, skinned and cleaned them, cut them up and left them to soak overnight in a pot with a handful of salt thrown in. The next day we brought the rabbits to a quick boil and then drained the water off to get rid of the salt. They were left to simmer on the stove

while we went hunting and when we returned, potatoes, onions, carrots and seasoning was added, cooked and thickened. Man! did that ever taste good after a morning in the bush.

The owls are making their appearance again as they migrate from the north in search of food. Remember, these birds are protected and must not be shot.

According to this month's edition of Rod and Gun, fishermen never cease to enjoy this sport, proof of this comes from Montreal where over 100 registered with the Montreal Anglers and Hunters for a six week fly tying course. All of which proves fishing is a year around sport and a good part of it is the pleasant companionship and off-season fun it provides.
