The Cost of Administration

Council's Attendance Costs \$3,554

It cost Milton's taxpayers \$3,554 for council's municipal administration in 1963, figures obtained from clerk E. J. Costigan show.

Mayor S. G. Childs receives a straight \$850 per year remuneration for his work as chief magistrate, and councillors, reeve and deputy-reeve each receive \$8

per council meeting. There were 47 council meetings in 1963, with a total attendance of councillors at 338 meetings out of a possible 366 attendances.

A total of \$2,704 was paid the six councillors, reeve and deputy and Mayor Childs received his \$850 honorarium, for a total of \$3,554.

Councillors Charles Menefy and Austan Ledwith had the best attendance with 46 out of 47 meetings each. Deputy-reeve Jim Bell and councillor Norm Pearce attended 45; councillors George Purdy and Charles Johnson 42; Reeve C. A. Martin 40, and councillor Charles Wilson 32.

Busy '63 for Building Permits \$309,700 Issue in Township

The Township of Nassagaweya saw \$309,700 worth of new construction started during 1963, clerk Don McMillan reported this week.

In December just one permit was for a \$10,000 dwelling — was taken out. Throughout the year, 16 new homes were erected, as well as extensive renovations to

Birch Hills Golf Club, and an addition to Campbell Lodge, Campbellville.

February was the township's biggest building permit month, with \$85,000 worth of permits issued. There were no permits taken out in January or September, and other months ranged from \$4,000 to \$49,000.
