## Schools Worst Hit In 1963 Crime List

Milton Police investigated 19 breaking and entering incidents and 49 thefts during 1963, according to Police statistics compiled this week. The value of articles and money stolen totaled \$3,121.50. Police also recovered stolen articles totaling \$956.43 during this year.

Most serious of the break-ins was at the Milton District High schools, where thieves stole \$385 and caused damage in excess of \$500.

## Drivers More Accident-Prone \$27,247 Property Toll in 1963

Drivers in the Milton area became more accident-prone each year, according to year-end statistics compiled this week by the Milton Police Department. During 1963, members of the Milton Police Force investigated 168 accidents, resulting in four injuries that needed treatment and \$27,247 estimated property damage.

The property damage and accident figures are both records for the town and are considerably higher than the 1962 figures of 146 accidents and \$17,026 property damage.

**Worst of the Year**  
The first and last months of the year, January and December, shared the dubious distinction of having the most accidents, 22 each month. January was the worst month of the year for property damage, due mainly to \$3,000 damage when an oil truck turned over on Ontario St.

During the summer holiday months of July and August, accidents showed a noticeable decrease, with only 13 in July resulting in \$495 damage and nine in August resulting in \$748 damage. Here are the year's figures:
