County Administration Means 197 Meetings, \$23,000 Salaries

Halton County Council conducted in 1963. And the meetings cost close to \$23,000.

Figures obtained from the clerk's and treasurer's office this week show there were 197 meetings, afternoon and evening meetings involving the 14 members of Halton County Council, including the various council committees plus the Manor Board, Museum Board, Board of Health and Children's Aid Society to which council appoints representatives. (At that, the figures were incomplete

and the total could go even higher.)

For their work on these committees and on council, the councillors were paid \$20 per meeting, and incomplete figures show the total cost of administration reaching a record \$22,811 for 1963.

The chore of recording proceedings at the various council and committee gatherings was almost evenly split between Clerk - Administrator Garfield Brown and Deputy Clerk Jim Andrews. Mr. Brown sat in on 94, and Mr. Andrews went to 92.
