When Milton hockey teams were drawing their good crowds several years ago, they played their games on Friday night and most of the farmers in the district attended. I just don't understand why they'd change to Sunday."

Regardless of the reasons why the team isn't being supported, it nevertheless is necessary to have a little bit of money on hand to pay for the expenses that crop up. When the money isn't available, standard procedure is for the club to fold. Chances are the folding process won't happen this year or next, but you never can

When team officials prepare for next winter's schedule, they no doubt will seriously examine the possibility of regaining Friday night for home games. But this alone can't be the problem.
