Oakville leads Halton municipalities in assessment, according to figures quoted at the inaugural meeting of County Council on Tuesday.
On allowing Oakville a casting vote to break a tie in the first round of voting for the Warden, Clerk Administrator G. Brown noted Oakville had an assessment of \$111,583,674.
Burlington runs second with \$97,620,756 and then there's a sharp drop to Georgetown's \$15,428,298. Esquering is next with \$9,215,315 followed by Milton's \$8,439,878, Acton's \$6,984,855 and Nassagaweya's \$3,195,260.

Globe of May 1891 Offers Suits at \$7.50

A crumbling, yellowed copy of the Toronto Globe, dated May 27, 1891, turned up this week as a backing piece for an old mirror. Fred Verstraete found it and brought it to The Champion.

Being a tailor, Mr. Verstraete was interested in one of the ads for men's clothing on sale at "60 cents on the dollar." The ad admonished readers to rush in and buy up the big stock of clothing on hand, and "if you've been accustomed to give \$12 for a suit, bring \$7.50 and see yourself save good money." (At those prices, no wonder those good old days were so good.)

The paper was full of patent medicine ads, stock market quotations, and front-page news from Toronto, Montreal, Ottawa, London, Kingston, Peterborough and Hamilton. One front page story concerned an illness of Sir John A. Macdonald and a vicious attack on Sir Charles Tupper, the High Commissioner, for an unjustified attack on the Grand Trunk Railway.
