



LIGNY PUBLIC SCHOOL near Milton is the oldest school in Esqueving Township and is probably one of the earliest schools in Ontario. The building shown above with the class of 1920 is the present building erected in 1874, and is believed to be the third Ligny school. The first was on the Robertson farm and the second on the First Line on Bowman's farm, according to M. J. Carton who loaned the photo. The building was closed to students last summer when the new Pineview School opened near Hornby, and since has been purchased by Scotch Block W. I. as a community hall. Among the notable students who attended this school were two judges, W. J. Elliott and D. McGibbon, as well as many other prominent citizens of both Esqueving and Nassagaweya.

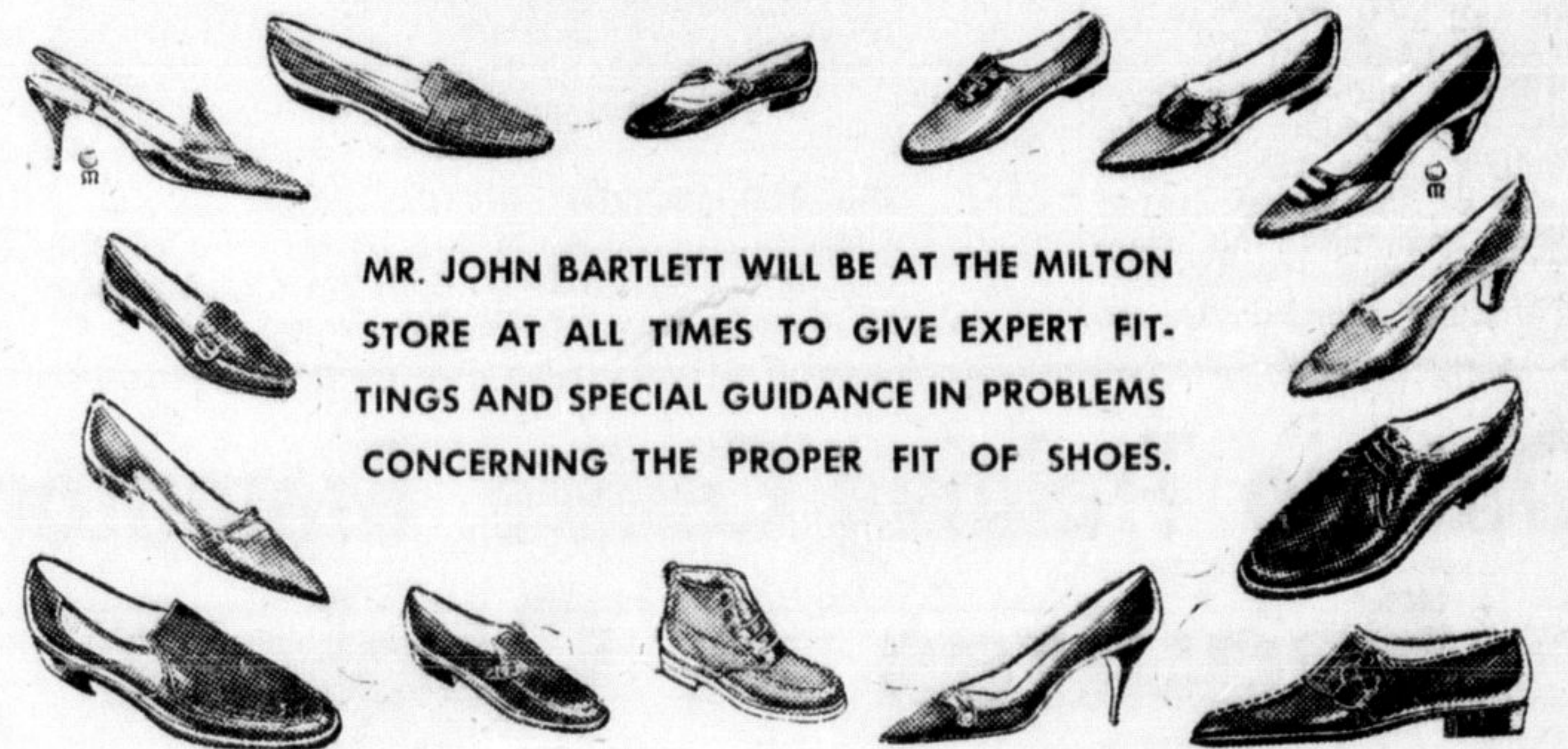

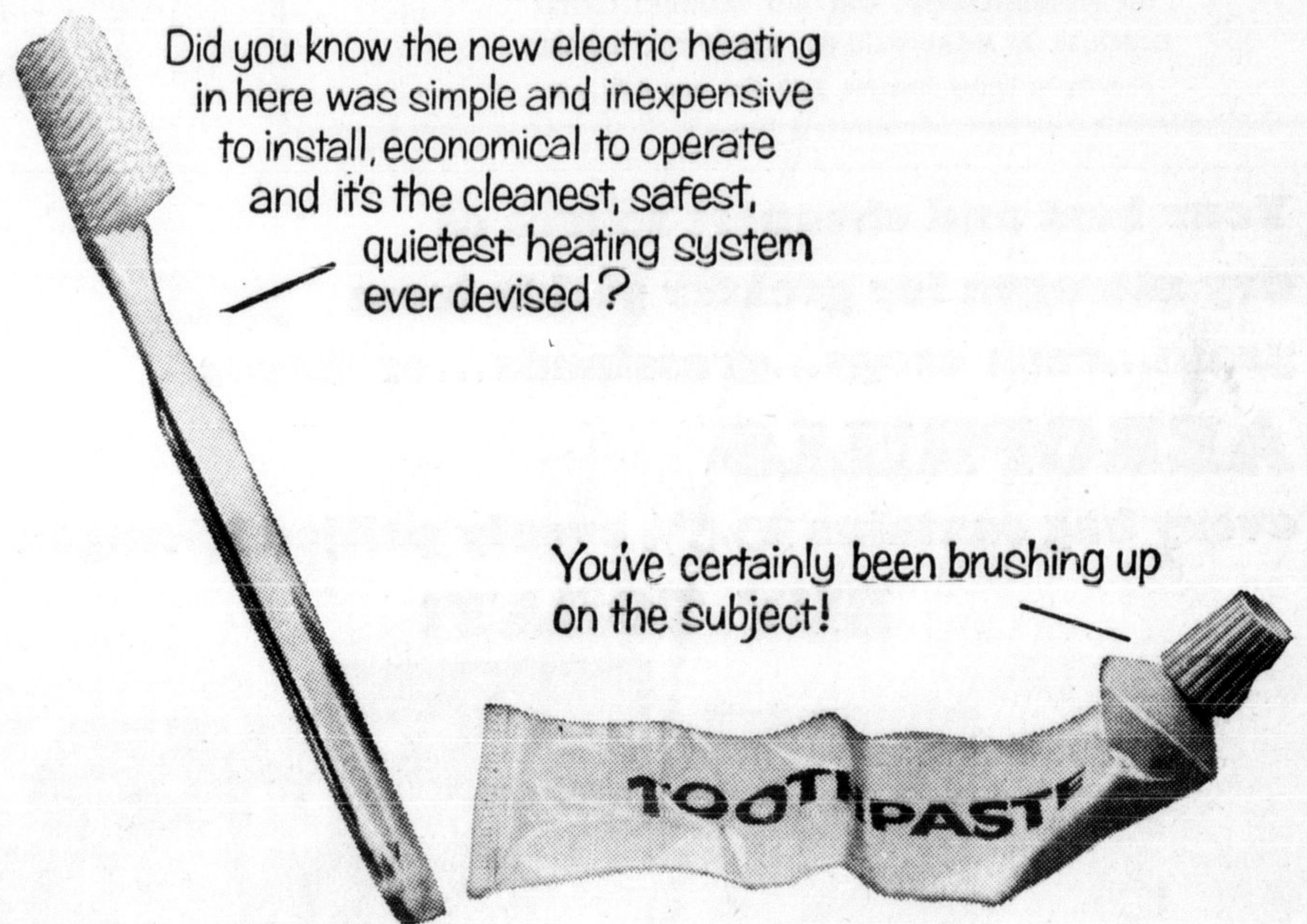
