Elect '64 Officers, Hear Reports At Grace Church Vestry Meeting

The largest crowd in recent years — over 80 — attended the annual Vestry Meeting of Grace Anglican Church on Monday, Jan. 27, to elect church officers, set a budget, hear reports of officers and organizations, and discuss plans for the coming year.

Rev. Dr. T. M. Dustan, Rector, chaired the meeting, assisted by the church wardens.

The meeting approved a 1964 budget totalling \$21,250, up \$250 from last year. Almost one-quarter of the budget — \$5,000 — is the church's apportionment to the Anglican Synod, while \$9,100 of the budget will go for salaries, car allowance and pension fund. It includes \$2,200 slated for repairs to the church, rectory and organ, and a \$600 repayment on the Synod loan, plus funds to carry the usual expenses of the church for a year.

Bishops Visit

He recalled the visits of two foreign bishops during the Anglican World Congress last summer and the month's preaching visit of the Rev. S. Goldthorpe from the United States in July. Mr. Watson moved a special vote of thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Robert Brush who assisted the Powell family prior to their departure for Mr. Powell's new post in Western Kansas. During the year considerable renovations had been carried out on the Rectory, and other renovations in the church.

Rector's Warden Harry Smith was re-named for 1964. He expressed appreciation to those who helped the Powell family at their departure, the Cent-A-Meal helpers, sidesmen's chairman C. Clarke, Howard Armstrong for his untiring efforts at the Rectory, the afternoon and evening branches of the W.A., the Advisory Council and his fellow Wardens.

"This coming year is going to be quite a challenge," he predicted. "Our commitments will be greater than in other years."

Deputy Warden

Hugh Beatty was appointed Deputy Warden, and Bob McCuaig was re-elected treasurer.

Elected to the advisory council were Brian Best, Kenneth Brush, Kenneth Watson, Art Hampson, Miss Margaret Maxwell and Mrs. Hazel Porter. The Rector, Wardens and Synod delegates are also members.

Synod delegates named were Frank Thompson, Dr. C. A. Martin and Howard Griswold, with U. J. Waters as alternate.

Robert Burne and C. Bounsell were re-elected auditors. Mrs. H. Beatty was chosen envelope secretary, and Robert Burne and C. Clarke chairmen of sidesmen. Kenneth Brush acted as Vestry Clerk for the meeting.

Members Decrease

In his report, the Rector noted

the figures show a slight decrease in church membership over the past two years. He announced Holy Communion would be observed at the first and third 11 a.m. Sunday services of each month, at least until Easter, on a trial basis. Formerly Communion was only held on the first Sunday. Communion is also to be celebrated on Thursday mornings and on Saints' days, and during Holy Week from Monday to Thursday.

The matter of discontinuing or changing the hour or type of service held Sunday evenings, was to be left for the Advisory Committee to study. The Rector noted attendance was usually low and several suggestions were received from the meeting for boosting evening attendances.

Pleased Here

He expressed his appreciation to the Wardens for their help in getting him established at his new charge last November, and his pleasure with the town and the church. He also paid tribute to the officers within the church, for their work and help.

Dr. Dustan pointed out Grace was one of 123 churches in the Niagara Diocese, and Milton's \$5,000 share was just one small part of the Diocesan budget of \$450,000. Of this, \$160,000 goes for mission work outside the Diocese.

When Sunday School superintendent Art Hampson appealed for more teachers to help this work, the Rector stressed the importance of proper education among the youth of the church, and suggested the Advisory Council set up a new committee to study Christian Education.

A paper on the recent Halton Deanery meeting and the establishment of a fund for the Anglican World Mission, prepared by A. E. Crucefix, was read to the meeting by Howard Armstrong. The church plans to participate with a financial contribution, but a goal has yet to be set. The

Treasurer Bob McCuaig reviewed the church financial statement for 1963, with expenditures totalling \$21,274.07. Of this, \$500 was paid toward the Synod loan which now stands at \$1,267.35.

Hear From Organizations

Other financial reports considered and approved included the W.A. afternoon branch, by Mrs. G. Morley; the Sunday School, Miss Muriel Newell; Girls' Auxiliary; W.A. evening branch, Mrs. A. Hampson; Little Helpers; Chancel Guild, Mrs. J. Hannant; and Senior Choir, Mrs. Hazel Porter.

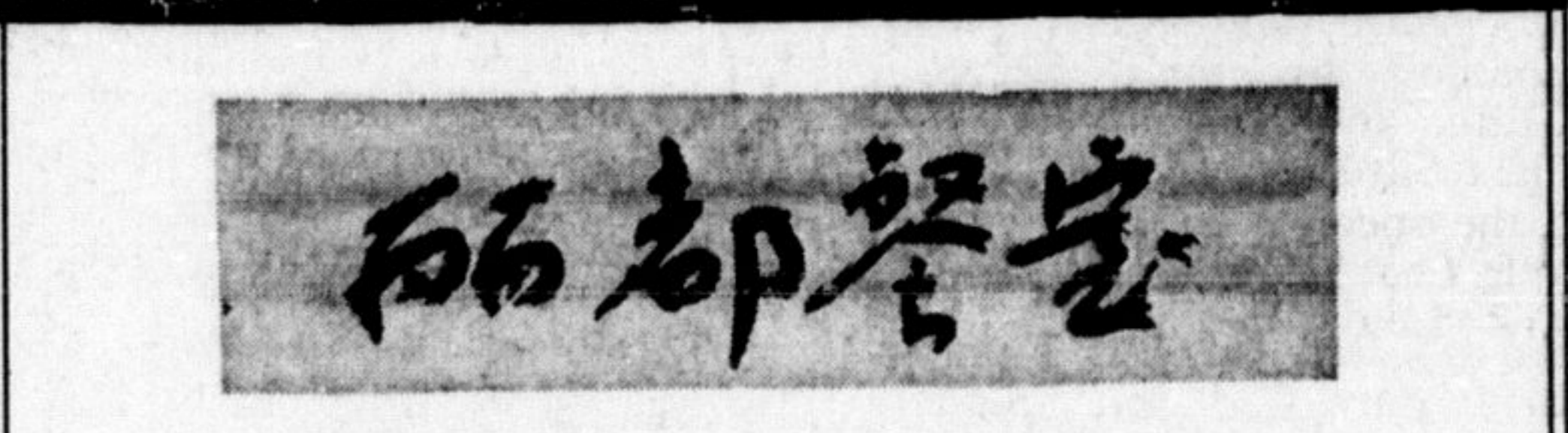
Thanks was also expressed to the Sunday School officers, members of organizations, organist Mrs. A. Ledwith and associate Rector Canon F. H. Mason for their work.
