### Job Placement Up in January

An increase of 15 per cent in the placement of workers in the area during January 1964 over January 1963 was recorded by the National Employment Service manager, Miss E. L. Hartwell reported this week.

At the present time, approximately 1017 men and women are registered for employment, the same number as last year. Taking into account the increased labor force, this can be considered an improvement over prior years, she said.

**300 in Construction**  
Of the male unemployed, 300 are construction workers, while 50 are truck drivers; 110 female clerical workers and 30 female sales clerks make up the largest groups of unemployed in the area.

The upgrading course for academic skills started this week with 11 men registered to increase their educational standards to grades 9 and 10. Once this necessary academic standing has been reached, it is hoped these men will be able to take Canadian Vocational Training courses in trades of their choice. The course is at the Oakville-Trafalgar High School, using the school's facilities after regular school hours.

More applicants are required before the proposed Homemaker Course can get underway. Women who have a desire to serve the community in the social service field should contact the local N.E.S. office at 130 George St., Oakville, to find out the facts in respect to this very interesting course.

### Coulter Named Wheat Delegate Producers Vote on Higher Levy

A. Roy Coulter of Campbellville, present chairman of the Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board, was Monday returned as wheat committee member from Halton County.

Mr. Coulter is also a director on the board for the counties of Halton, Wentworth, Lincoln, Welland and Haldimand.

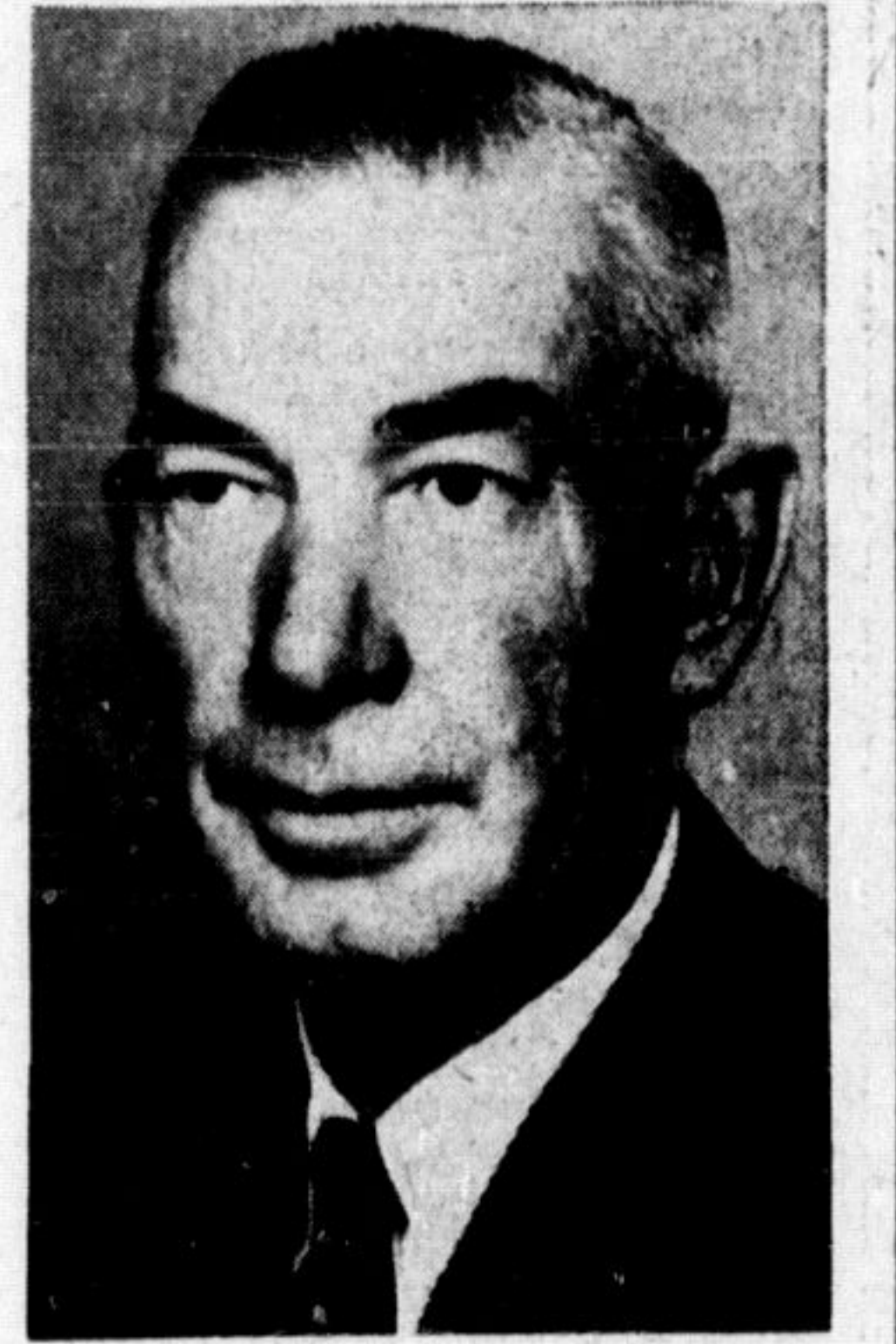
Last year Halton had two representatives on the Ontario committee, but since the number of county wheat producers has declined, the county was given just one representative for 1964. Walter Royle of Oakville and Mr. Coulter were delegates last year.

**Vote on Levy**  
Monday afternoon at a general meeting of county wheat producers, only 13 of the eligible 255

county producers attended to ballot on an increased levy for the marketing of their product. In former years a 10 cent a bushel levy had been sufficient, however this year the marketing board asked to approve a larger amount, not to exceed 10 per cent of the negotiated minimum price.

The 13 producers — plus two who signed an affidavit and filled in ballots prior to the meeting — all voted on the increased levy. Assistant Agricultural Representative J. Douglas Burnside conducted the vote, and forwarded the 15 ballots to the Ontario committee, where they will be counted and tabulated some time in March.

Otis McGregor, assistant secretary of the marketing board, attended the meeting.
