Retarded Chairman Research At Recent Seminar in Ottawa

Mrs. John C. Hill of Hornby, chairman of the research committee of the North Halton Association for Retarded Children, attended the fourth annual research seminar of the Ontario and Quebec Retarded Children's Associations in Ottawa, Friday and Saturday.

Several prominent speakers addressed the seminar, including a dozen prominent U.S., English and Canadian authorities. One important breakthrough in the research field, Mrs. Hill reports, is a study that will be taken of some 50,000 American women and the children they bear. They will be studied from early pregnancy until the children are seven years of age, for every possible clue that may relate conditions affecting the parents to subsequent abnormalities in their child.

The U.S. National Institute of Neurological Diseases and Blindness at Bethesda, Maryland, will conduct the vast research project and collect data from 15 other medical centres across the U.S. The study actually began five years ago and will continue

until 1972. About 100 causes of mental retardation have been pin-pointed by medical science in recent years, Mrs. Hill reports, and this study will seek more causes and a better understanding of those 100 causes already identified.

Oakville Board Sets Salaries

The education committee of the Board of Education for the Town of Oakville and the Secondary School Teachers' Committee reached an amicable conclusion to the 1964-1965 salary negotiations.

The following salary schedule will be adopted for the 1964-1965 teaching year:

Category 1, minimum \$4,800; maximum \$8,400; category 2, \$5,200 to \$8,700; category 3, \$5,800 to \$9,800; category 4, \$6,300 to \$10,300; vice-principals, \$11,300 to \$12,800; principals, \$13,300 to \$14,800; and supervising principals \$15,300 to \$16,800.

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"Pig Tail Supper" Gains Pool \$100
