**Georgetown Captures Titles At Four-Town Tournament**

Just a word this week about the ancient weapon, the bow and arrow. Since more and more people are taking up the sport, we think it would be wise to point out several of the dangers and advantages of bow hunting. According to the Department of Lands and Forests, a bow and arrow will be considered a firearm if and when an amendment to the fish and game act is made.

The bow commonly used in hunting and target practice is shorter than the original English long-bow and made famous by the legendary Robin Hood of Sherwood Forest. The Indians in the 1600's used bows as weapons of war and also for hunting, and they were very adept at the use of the crude bow and flint tipped arrows they had.

The bows in use today are just as deadly as those used by Indians, so please keep them out of the reach of children. The great improvements in firearms in the past two centuries have made them superbly accurate, but the bow and arrows still remain effective.
