The reduced grant was proposed in the report of the finance and welfare committee, and the deputy reeve asked why it had been reduced.

Oakville's Reeve Herb Merry, chairman of the finance committee, admitted he was on the spot, but suggested the request had not been received until considerably after the county budget had been set.

M.M.H.A. Executive Announces Proposed Changes

The Milton Minor Hockey Association announced this week the proposed changes and amendments that will be discussed at the association's annual meeting on Sunday, May 3.

CONSTITUTION ADDITIONS
(1) The Executive Membership shall appoint a Referee-in-Chief and a Representative to TCMHA, and these two persons shall be designated as non-voting members of the Executive Membership.

(2) The following insurance coverage shall be retained as the minimum necessary for safe operation of MMHA, and is as follows: Equipment coverage, \$1,000.00; Premises and Operations Liability in the amount of \$100,000.00 each person, \$200,000.00 each accident, and \$5,000.00 property damage; Non-owned automobile insurance covering claims arising from player transportation to games in the amount of \$200,000.00, and the usual player insurance, including dental care. In addition, each Town Team is to carry a First Aid Kit at all times, and a First Aid Kit is to be kept at the Time-keeper's Bench during all House League games and practices.

(3) The official crest of MMHA is designated as being circular, with a diameter of six inches. Upon a white background is imposed a forest-green maple leaf, and upon this leaf is superimposed a gold beaver. The white background is encircled with a forest-green band whose inner diameter is three and one half inches, and the outer diameter is five and one half inches. Upon this band is imprinted Milton Minor Hockey Association in gold lettering. A gold band, one quarter of an inch wide encircles this name band.

(4) MMHA only, will provide all crests for House League Finalists and Champions, with the sponsors concerned given the option of providing team name tabs for the crests. MMHA will also ensure that there is a section championship trophy and a scoring championship trophy for each classification, — i.e. — Novice, Pee Wee, Bantam, Midget. These trophies may be donated by parties outside of MMHA, if they so desire.

(5) MMHA shall wholeheartedly participate in the Annual Four Town Tournament, which is usually held on a convenient Saturday early in March. MMHA shall accept its sequential turn as the host town, which will occur in 1964-65 season, for as long as this tournament is in existence. The coach and manager, if willing, of the House League team in first place in each division as of six weeks prior to the tournament date, shall be given the privilege of handling the Milton entries.

RULES CHANGES
Proposed changes to the rules and regulations section of the constitution are as follows:

(1) The rules, regulations and information contained on the Player's Application form of MMHA are to be considered the body of Rule 1 of this section, with the addition of the following subsections:

(a) the presently numbered Rule 1.
(b) the presently numbered

The House League coach only is to inform the player of his impending tryout, and holds priority on his services until the player is accepted on the Town Team. No tryouts will be permitted after January 31st of the current season, except for extenuating circumstances, which must be approved by the Executive.

times, and it has now reached the point where an architect has been commissioned to prepare plans for a new Administrative Building to include a council chamber, four private offices, a vault for records and a general office and public information area. The estimated cost to the Township for this building has been quoted as in the neighbourhood of \$40,000.00.

In order to meet this expenditure we understand that the Council is proposing to—

1. Borrow \$18,000. from the Municipal Loan Fund.
2. Raise \$13,000. from the sale of debentures.

3. Take \$9,000. from the Township's credit balance.

Requests for loans from the Municipal Loan Fund must be made by May 31st, 1964 which means that if council is to proceed with these plans they must approve legislation for this expenditure almost immediately.

This, therefore, leaves us the Taxpayers, very little time to express our feelings about such a major expenditure and tax hike for, in order to pay off this \$31,000. debt, the tax rate of the Township would be raised 1/2 mill for the next 20 years.

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RECIPE OF THE MONTH

By the Ontario Tender Fruit Institute
"Buy Canada Choice Canned Fruit"

BLACK CHERRY WHIP

Makes 10 Servings

1-1/3 cups evaporated milk

- (15-oz.) can "Canada Choice" Sweet Bing Cherries
- (3-oz.) package black cherry jelly powder
- cup dry sherry or orange juice
- tablespoon lemon juice

Freeze evaporated milk in freezer tray until crystals form around edge of tray. Halve and pit drained cherries, reserving juice. Heat juice to boiling point add jelly powder, stir until dissolved. Stir in remaining ingredients, cook slightly. Stir all but 10 cherry halves into jelly and chill until softly set. Fold stiff-whipped chilled evaporated milk into gelatine mixture. Spoon into sherberts, garnish with remaining cherry halves, chill until set. (About 3 hours.)
