The most welcome legislation presented to the Provincial Legislature this week was an act to amend the Retail Sales Tax Act. The Bill is to extend the exemption for sales tax to all bequests of personal property instead of just to bequests between certain close relatives.

Provision is also made whereby municipalities, school boards, hospitals, universities and certain similar institutions may buy materials for construction of buildings exempt from sales tax instead of paying the tax and later applying for rebate.

Effective June 1
This amendment will become effective June 1 next and will lessen the administrative burden of the organizations referred to above.

Busines used to provide public transportation within the municipality, purchased on or after March 1, 1964, are now exempt from sales tax.

The present regulation requiring non-resident contractors to provide a deposit for their sales tax liability is being expanded to provide alternatives and it is being incorporated into the Act.

The Hon. A. A. Wishart, O.C., Ontario's Attorney - General, spoke last week in his new role and indicated, in a general way, his opinion as to how his department should deal with the recommendations contained in the report of the Ontario Police Commission.

Mr. Wishart is a serious and sincere gentleman. I feel that the new amending legislation which will soon be presented will be acceptable to the majority of the members of the House. Mr. Wishart is a former small town lawyer who has been engaged in general practice for nearly 30 years. He arrives at conclusions after careful consideration and I doubt if he will ever be caught out on a limb.

In his remarks to the House during debate last week, he referred to one section of the Crime Report which reads as follows: "The Commission finds that it is admitted that the law enforcement agencies in the United States have extreme difficulty in coping effectively with organized and syndicated crime of the Mafia-like type in that
