200 Students Participate in Career Night

An estimated 200 senior students participated in a Career night sponsored by the Milton and District University Women's Club on Wednesday evening of last week in Milton.

Students from Acton District High School and Milton District High School were able to select two vocations from among 24 outlined, in two 30 minute sessions.

Stick With School

Richard Gooday, vice-principal of Western Technical-Commercial School, Toronto, in his theme speech to all the students urged them to "stick with school as long as possible, and come back for more later".

In hearing the specialists in various fields, he suggested students should not misinterpret the enthusiasm shown by others in a group for their own. As guidelines, he suggested they ask what they mean to them in terms of their own personality, in terms of their own character and in terms of their abilities.

The speaker was introduced by Mrs. R. B. Frame, president of the University Women and thanked by Principal R. C. Hunter.

The installation of the new officers will take place on Sunday May 3rd.

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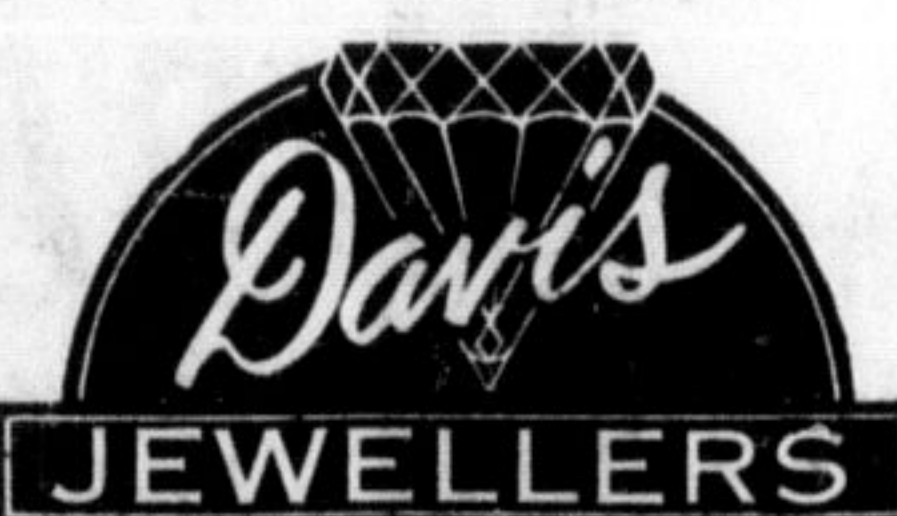
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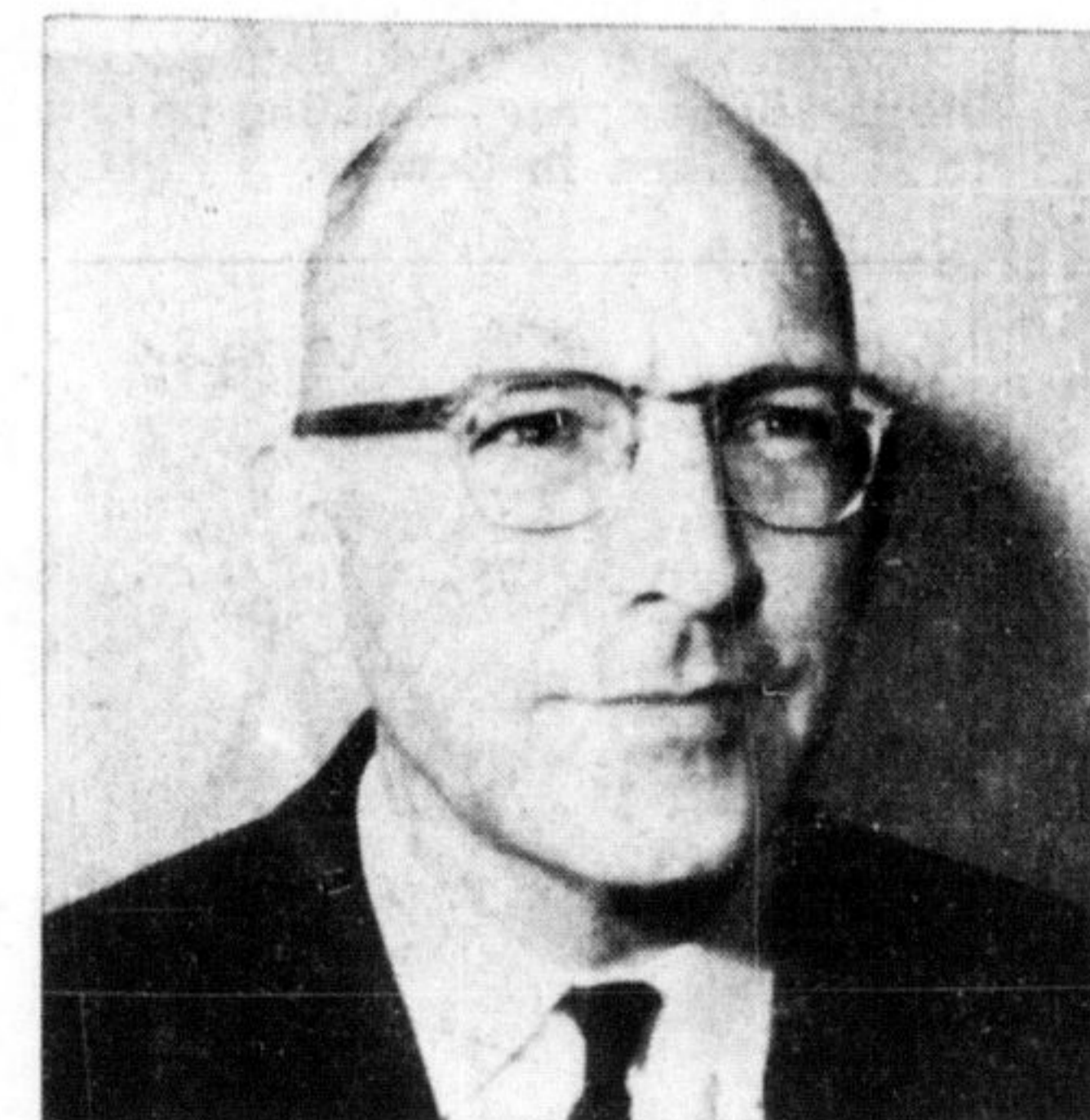
