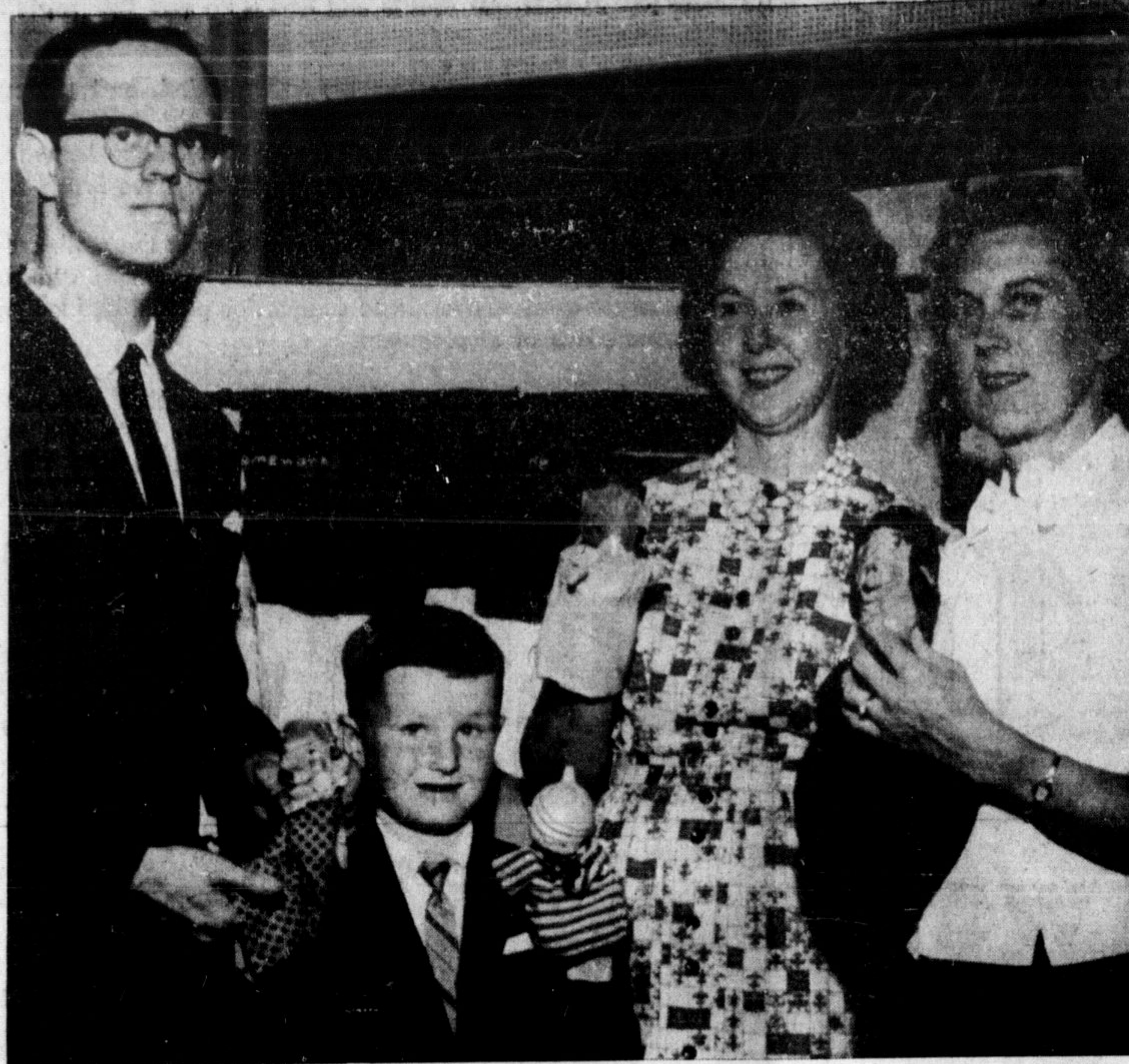
Reports Given

Warned About Arrears

Esqueusing Records \$2,019 Deficit

A slight deficit on the 1963 operations was recorded in the Township of Esqueusing Auditor's report, released recently.

Auditors Lever, Hoskin, Chagnon and MacGillivray noted the deficit of \$2,019.93 was deducted from the surplus carried forward from prior years and this surplus now stands at \$15,992.44.

Unpaid Taxes
The report called attention to the unpaid taxes "which now stand at \$144,391.57, representing in total 32 per cent of the current year's levy."

"In our opinion, this is a potentially dangerous situation and should be a matter for concern. A determined effort should be

made to reduce these unpaid taxes," the report continued.

Not Paid Over
The auditors also reported the share of supplementary tax was not paid over to the schools and county by December 31 "as is required by regulations".

'63 Fatality-Free Award Won by Town, Police

Milton's fatality free 1963 was acknowledged in the presentation of a certificate from the Canadian Safety Council to Police Chief Ray Andrew by Mayor S. G. Childs during the regular meeting of Milton Council Monday.

Mayor Childs noted Reeve C. A. Martin had accepted the certificate for the town in Toronto.

Martin Receives It
Reeve Martin praised the work of the Safety Council and noted

a number of municipalities were honored with similar certificates. In accepting the certificate Chief Andrew noted the police department was not the only group responsible. He praised the work of the citizens in observing safety rules and the work of the council in providing modern police equipment. The last local fatality was in July 1960.

The certificate is to be hung in the local police offices.
