purpose room?" councillor Mene-  
fy asked Trustee Johnson.

**For Whole Town**  
Mr. Johnson stressed the need for a general purpose room if the senior public school system was to be followed. He noted the last vote had been concerning an addition to the J. M. Denves School which was different from this proposal in that students from all over town would have the use of the facility.

Trustee Gowland pointed out that the capital budget presently included \$20,000 for a general purpose room and the balance required had been nearly covered in the Board's budget allocation that had been cut. "If we had proceeded last year it would have been there now and paid for."

The possibility of adjusting project figures within the total allocation of the capital budget was suggested. Provided for the project, including purchase of the school, renovations and part of the general purpose room, was \$158,500. Purchase price for the school and site was \$60,000.

**Water is First**  
Reeve C. A. Martin emphasized the importance to the town of developing the water source and line from the Kelso area and although this was estimated at \$150,000 in the capital budget, it appeared it would be closer to \$200,000 so no funds could be taken from that project. The \$10,000 Main St. widening had already been delayed to finance renovations to the library.

To the suggestion the school be taken over and the general purpose room be added later, Chairman Gowland told Council the Department of Education would not go for a senior public school without a general purpose room.

Councillor C. Fay suggested that if the council last year had approved construction of a general purpose room he would support it, but if no such approval had been given it should be voted on by the taxpayers.

**A Deal**  
Seeking a solution to the mounting dilemma, Councillor Best wondered if the Board would proceed with the \$78,500 allocated in debentures this year if council agreed to approve the general purpose room next year.

Members countered that the mechanics of such a suggestion would be difficult, and council could not commit next year's council to such an endorsement.

Reeve C. A. Martin suggested the council should go along on the \$158,500 allowed for public school purposes in the 1963 and 1964 capital budget and "worry about the balance next year."

**Increase Amount**  
Auditor Leaver warned that if the debenture issue was spent and the project uncompleted, the balance would have to come from general funds. He suggested he and the town clerk be per-

mitted to discuss the approval of the \$158,500 issue with the O.M.B. and explore the possibility of increasing it to cover the additional amount to complete the general purpose room.

Members agreed to this proposal and promised a further meeting when the results were known. Later the meeting was set for next Tuesday.

Board Solicitor Nichols then pressed for a decision on the capital and site amounts cut from the budget. He noted the two items were definite musts.

**Must Go Along**  
Chairman Gowland suggested the town had to go along with the figures in the budget.

This drew a flurry of cross-fire from members who objected to this attitude.

The solicitor noted the Board was not interested in debenturing the cost of the site, since it had been counted on from current funds. The auditor supported the fact this was one of the costs that could be paid from current funds under Department requirements.

The solicitor noted the \$5,500 for the site was allocated to the Board in 1963 and was now Board money and could not be deleted from subsequent budget.

**An Imposition**  
Councillor C. Johnson suggested it was an imposition on the taxpayer to have money there and the town having to pay interest to borrow money.

Trustee Johnson noted the whole problem developed over the delays that had developed in completing the projects.

Discussions were halted as it was concluded the two points of view could not be settled until some word was received from the Ontario Municipal Board.

## Fireworks Care Firemen's Plea

"Be especially careful with fireworks this weekend," Milton Area Fire Department members urged today as the Victoria Day holiday weekend approaches.

Fireworks cannot be sold in town, but children manage to buy them in neighboring communities, explained Chief A. E. Clement. Letting off rockets in town is prohibited by a town by-law, unless the group in charge of the display first receives a permit from the Fire Department. The permit allows a display provided there are plenty of competent adults in charge, and as long as the person responsible agrees to accept responsibility in case of a fire.

Chief Clement said firefighters would be available to help supervise group displays of fireworks, if needed. Last year a shed at the C.P.R. station was burned to the ground and children throwing firecrackers were blamed.

## School Board Briefs

Milton Public School Board Trustees met briefly on Monday evening at the J. M. Denves school, following a two hour budget discussion with Town Councillors in the Town Hall. During the brief meeting, members:

- Agreed to purchase paper supplies estimated at \$4,089.86 from Buntin Gillies for use in the three schools.

**Outside Student**  
• Accepted Eric Harrop as a kindergarten student in September, Eric, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Harrop, lives just outside the town boundary. His parents will pay the usual registration fee required by the Board from out of town students.

- Agreed to purchase ball point pens at a cost of \$22.92 per gross, for use by students in the three schools. The pens will be marked, "property of the Milton Public School Board."

- Learned that 125 children have been registered for kindergarten in September, three less than the number now attending kindergarten.

**Off to Circus**  
• Agreed to regulate school hours on May 27 so that students can attend a Circus Matinee which will be sponsored by the Lions Club of Milton. Classes will begin at 8:45 a.m. end for lunch at 11:45 a.m. They will resume for the afternoon at 12:45 and end for the day at 2:30 p.m.

- Instructed the board secretary to write Local 4970, thanking them for allowing the teachers of the Bruce St. school to hold Physical Education classes in the building.

—Bowling season is over for the league bowlers, and banquets are the order of the day.

## Arrange Open House For Mohawk Raceway

Harness racing followers and people who are just plain inquisitive, will have an opportunity to tour Mohawk Raceway on Sunday afternoon, when the Ontario Jockey Club holds the first "open house" of the season from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. A year ago when Mohawk inaugurated these free visits, nearly 7,500 visitors including droves of children turned up for conducted tours through the stable area and demonstrations on the track by leading drivers.

CFRB radio personality Earl Warren will be master of ceremonies on Sunday and a special two-race card has been prepared by racing secretary Lew James.

Guides from the Niagara Harness Horsemen's Association will conduct visitors through the mutual plant, the track hospital and entire stable area. Free coffee, doughnuts and soft drinks will be provided.

Halton M.P.P. George A. Kerr, Burlington has been named to the Consumers Credit Committee of the Ontario government. The committee investigates borrowing and lending practices and hears evidence in cases of illegal door-to-door sales.

**ONE KILLED**  
Milino O.P.P. detachment reports one person killed, 20 injured and \$19,775 worth of property damage in the 35 motor vehicle accidents investigated in North Halton during April. It was their first fatality of the year.

Through the use of a tape recorder, the Kinsmen Club of Milton received personal greetings from Round Table club members in Bradford, Yorkshire, England at an Executive meeting Monday night.

Ray Smith, the international relations director of Bradford's Round Table No. 31, made the tape and mailed it to the local Kinsmen. He explained his club is also corresponding with Round Table, Apex and Active 20-30 clubs in Holland, Denmark, Germany, Sweden, South Africa and Southern Rhodesia. 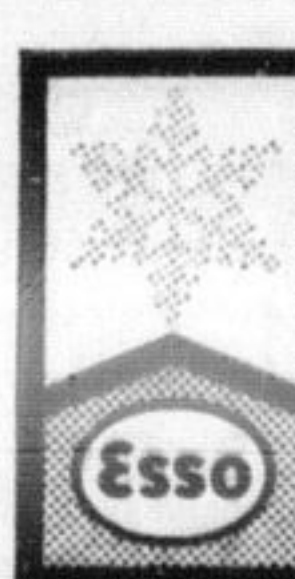
**Provincial Work**
