The first wheat grown in Canada was at Annapolis Royal, N.S., in 1604, when de Monts and Champlain started a settlement there before the founding of Quebec.

Canada's first subscription library was established in Quebec City in 1779 when a group of officers and merchants set up a 2,000 book library.

Fringe benefits provided in Canadian industry were estimated to cost \$1,202 per employee in 1961, nearly 25 per cent of payroll overhead.

Mount Logan, nearly 20,000 feet and Canada's highest, was first ascended in 1925.
