Orenda Wins Pay Increase

Orenda Engines employees won substantial wage increases in a two-year contract ratified by a 99 percent vote Sunday night. Management and Union representatives sat continuously with only coffee breaks, from 2:30 Thursday afternoon to 11 o'clock Friday morning to reach a settlement. Local 717, International Association of Mechanics, had voted 99.9 percent to strike last week, if an agreement was not reached.

All job classifications will be boosted seven to nine cents an hour at once, with further increase of seven to nine cents January 1, 1965. Workers will receive \$50 as retroactive pay settlement.

The contract covers all hourly paid employees within the plant. It stipulates the cost of living bonus will continue as it was under the previous agreement, with a one cent increase immediately.

Sick indemnity will be increased from \$45 to \$55 a week, with a two-day waiting period instead of the four-day wait under the previous agreement.

About 300 of Orenda's 1,200 employees make their homes in Georgetown.
