

(Makes 9 Servings)

crumbs

2 cups fine graham wafer

tablespoon brown sugar

1/4 cup butter, melted 11/2 teaspoons gelatine

3 tablespoons water

cheese

l cup sifted icing sugar 1 teaspoon lemon rind

2 teaspoons lemon juice

1 (20-oz.) can "Canada Choice" Cherry Pie Filling

Combine crumbs, brown sugar and butter. Press half mixture in bottom of buttered 9-inch sq. cake pan. Sprinkle gelatine over water; let stand 5 mins. to soften and dissolve over hot water. Cool. Cream cheese; gradually beat in icing sugar, lemon rind and juice. (8-ounce) package cream Blend gelatine into stifflywhipped cream; fold into cheese mixture. Spread half cheese mixture over crumbs in cake pan. Carefully spread cherry filling on top. Add remaining cheese mixture and sprinkle with re-1/2 pint (11/4 cups) whipping maining crumb mixture.
