### Law Restricts Air Gun Use

Far from being a mere toy, the teen-ager's air gun is regulated by the law as a firearm, and as such, is subject to the same rules as apply to Dad's moose rifle.  
The criminal code states that no person under the age of 14 years may possess an air gun without a special permit from the Provincial or Municipal Police. Few of these permits are granted.  
Hunting laws under the Game and Fish Act apply to hunting with air guns, as well as other types of firearms and they may not be used for hunting except under the authority of a hunting license.

### Yellow Rocket in Flower Soon Pull, Bury, Burn, or Spray

Have you noticed a mustard-like weed growing in your hay or pasture fields? If you have, this is Yellow Rocket. This weed is just coming into flower now. It is a primary noxious weed and should be destroyed.  
A few years ago, Canadian livestock losses due to pests came to \$100 million annually.

**FIGHT CANCER**

The use of clean or No. 1 seed is most important in preventing the spread of this weed. If there are only a few in a field, the easiest method is to pull them and bury or burn them. If piled up, some plants may mature. Another method is to clip early.  
Good control of Yellow Rocket can be obtained by spraying at the rate of 20 oz. of 2, 4-D per acre in early spring or in late September when the plant is in the early growth stages. However, if fields contain alfalfa or clover, 2, 4-D cannot be used. 2, 4-D is recommended at 20 oz. acid as ester in late September.

Charles Readhead, who lives with his stepson Vern McArthur near Lowville, will celebrate his 92nd birthday on Saturday, May 23rd. He was born in North Burlington and has spent his entire lifetime there.

Mr. Readhead also spent 14 years on Nelson school board plus a few years on the amalgamated Burlington Board of Education; was a director of Halton Mutual Fire Insurance Co. 21 years; has actively served many years in Lowville United Church including 12 years as treasurer; and spent several years assessing in Nelson and Trafalgar Townships.
