We are glad to report that Jack Davey and Tom Miller are both home from hospital and we hope they will continue to improve.

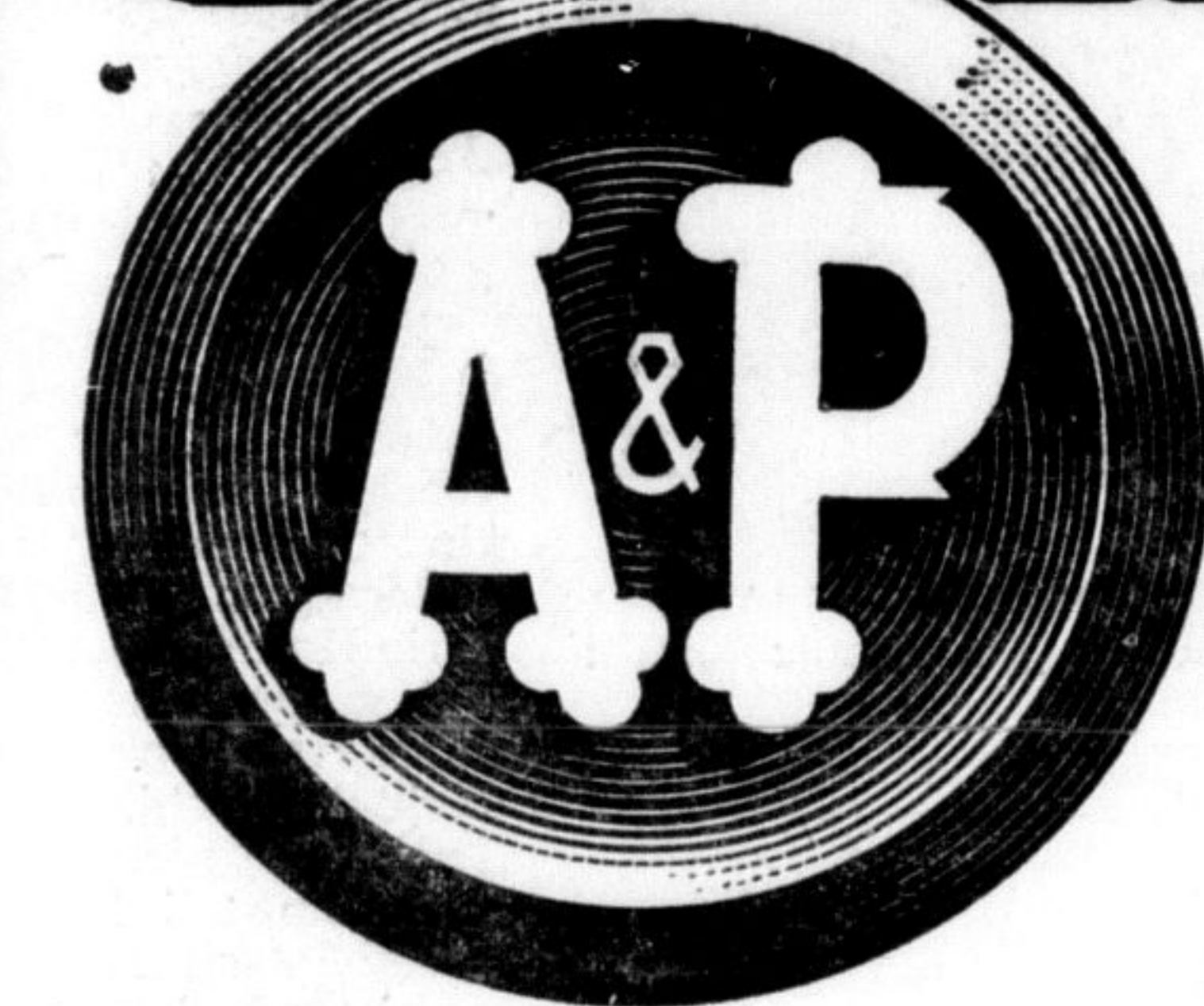
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
