RIGHT AROUND HOME

The chocolate-caramel combination, so popular in candies is every bit as interesting when used in a cake. As a matter of fact, the following cake makes one think of a milk chocolate bar, for it has a pleasing, mild chocolate flavor akin to that in the confection.

Light Chocolate-Caramel Cake features two, round layers with a medium-fine crumb. It's moist and cuts well. Cornstarch combined with the leavening make it a particularly light cake — in substance as well as flavor and color. The caramel filling, easily prepared from a pudding mix, has rich taste and smooth texture that set off the tender cake. An especially creamy frosting, in generous quantity, is the final trimming.

LIGHT CHOCOLATE-CARAMEL CAKE

(Yield) 1, 8-inch 2-layer cake 1-1/3 cups once-sifted all purpose flour 1/4 cup cornstarch 3 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup soft margarine or butter 1 cup granulated sugar 2 eggs, well beaten 1 teaspoon vanilla 3 ounces (3 squares) unsweetened chocolate, melted and cooled 3/4 cup milk Caramel filling Creamy Chocolate Icing Preheat oven to 350 deg. F. (moderate). Grease and lightly flour 2, 8-inch round layer pans. Sift together flour, cornstarch, baking powder and salt. Place margarine, sugar eggs and vanilla in large bowl of electric mixer. Beat at medium speed 5 minutes, until creamy, smooth and light. Stir in chocolate. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with milk, beginning and ending with flour mixture. (Beat with wooden spoon just until blended after each addition). Spread batter in prepared pans.

Bake in preheated moderate oven, 25 to 30 minutes, or until tester inserted in centre comes out clean. Remove to cooling racks; let stand 10 minutes; remove from pans; cool thoroughly on racks. Fill and frost.

Caramel Filling: Pour 3/4 cup cold milk into small mixing bowl. Sprinkle half of 3-3/4 ounce pkg. caramel instant pudding powder (approx. 1/3 cup) on top. Beat slowly with rotary beater for 1 minute. Chill. Spread between cooled cake layers.

Creamy Chocolate Icing: Cream together 1/4 cup soft margarine or butter, and 2-1/4 cups sifted icing sugar. Blend in pinch of salt, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 2 ounces (squares) melted unsweetened chocolate and enough (3 to 4 tablespoons) evaporated milk or cream to make icing of spreading consistency. Beat until fluffy. Makes enough to frost top and sides of 2, 8-inch layers.

Bike Licensing

"All two-wheel bicycles in the town of Milton must be licensed," Milton Police Chief Ray Andress advised youngsters this week.

The Main St. police office will be issuing licences from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. Monday to Friday — plus all day Saturday — from May 25 to May 30, he reports. There is no charge for the licences, but bikes must be in good mechanical shape and in good working order. This means the brakes, bells, fenders and tires must be in excellent condition.

Police point out the idea behind the licensing is to make sure every bike is roadworthy and safe. Licences also help if a bike is stolen, they added, so all owners should be sure they get their licence during next week.

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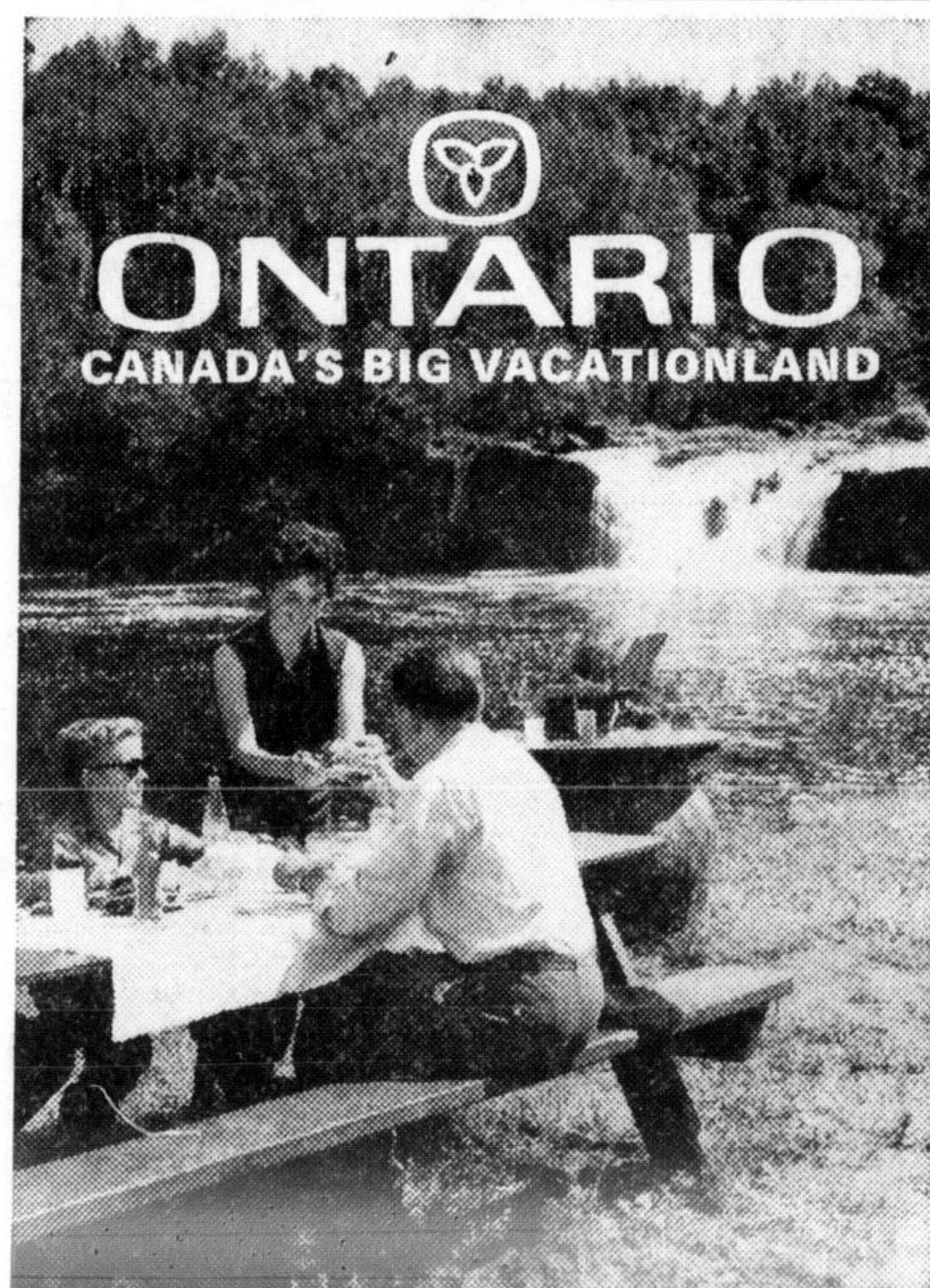
