Crowd of 1,000 Views Campbellville Fireworks

A crowd estimated at close to 1,000 poured into Campbellville ball park Monday evening, for the village baseball club auxiliary's annual 24th of May fireworks display.

Roy Wood and Bert Watson, the men in charge of lighting the rockets and sparklers and other fireworks, reported \$175 worth went up in smoke during the hour-long show. They had eight experienced men helping them and there were no accidents to mar the evening. All fireworks were let off on and beside the cement grandstand, behind a snowfence that kept even the most curious children away from the danger area.

Two Sections
Mr. Walton supervised the ground display, with Bert Wood, George Gadd and Tom Mitchell assisting. For the aerial display, Mr. Wood was in charge with Jack McPhail, Doug Agnew, Jack Wood, Stan Price and Hugh Murphy helping out.

Mr. Wood, who's been working on the village display for 16

years — 14 of them as the "boss" — explained the ball club has always purchased their fireworks from the Hand Chemical Co. They buy one pre-arranged display worth \$100 and a second at \$75, for best selection.
