John Black Wins Scholarship Attains Political Science M.A.

A Moffat student who has attained his Master's degree in political science at University of Western Ontario has been declared the winner of a MacKenzie King Travelling Scholarship valued at \$2,000.

John Black, son of Mr. and Mrs. William H. Black, of Moffat, was notified of his success after completing six years of University studies in London, Ont. He will receive his M.A. degree at the University of Western Ontario convocation, May 30.

After spending this summer on the teaching staff at Western, he will leave in September to attend the School of Economics and political Science at the University of London, England, where he will continue his studies leading to Ph.D. His work there will be in the field of international relations with emphasis on international communications.

In 1962-63 he held a university teaching fellowship in political science, and during the past year has been head of the order department of University of Western Ontario library.



A graduate of Milton High School, Mr. Black has had an outstanding record at the university, and previously won scholastic honors. He entered university in the fall of 1958 and gained his honor B.A. in Journalism in 1962.

His interest in the field of journalism dates prior to his enrollment at Western U. Throughout his high school and college years he not only attained high standing, but found time to en-

gage in the practical side of newspaper and radio work. He has corresponded for several metropolitan and provincial dailies as reporter - photographer and feature writer. Many of his photos grace the pages of Milton High yearbooks.
