Hear Hall Bid

Site Opposition Continues

Oakville's application to the Ontario Municipal Board for \$1,025,000 for acquisition of the \$425,000 T. Eaton property on the Seventh Line, and the eventual erection of a \$600,000 municipal building there, went before the O.M.B. at a hearing in Oakville last week. A decision will be handed down later.
Chief among these opposing the application were the residents of Ward One, who had forced the 1962 vote on a town hall site and had swung the vote to favor the "Trafalgar Square" site further north on the Seventh Line. At the time, it had been a choice between that and a Navy St. site closer to downtown Oakville, and the vote (which was ordered by the O.M.B.) was strongly in favor of the Seventh Line.
New Site
Oakville Council had since picked an altogether new site just north of the Queen Elizabeth Highway, and it was approved by council with only Ward One Councilor W. E. Ford opposed. Ward One representative Joseph Willmott, who had earlier held out for the Trafalgar Square location, changed his mind and voted for the Eaton property when he decided the newest site was a "compromise" and offered as much as the Trafalgar Square location.

The Ward One Ratepayers were represented by W. E. Williston, who charged there were three breaches of faith. Two were by council — to the people who favored amalgamation with the Seventh Line site a promised location, and to the voters who approved the site. The third breach was by the O.M.B., who did not do by the results of the plebiscite.
Sell Part
In their submission to the board the town, represented by J. J. Robinette and John Depew, OC, town solicitor, said it intends to sell 50 acres of land fronting on the Queen Elizabeth Way for prestige industrial sites.
Another 25 acres to the north and east side of the administration office site will be sold for residential development. Plans prepared by the planning board suggest this area will lend itself to single family housing apartments and maisonettes overlooking the Queen Elizabeth Way.
Other witnesses said the town was wrong to gamble with taxpayers' money in the hopes the real estate venture would pay off.

Adjust Salaries
Extend Holidays
Adjustments in the salaries of the town employees were approved by Milton Council Monday and all employees will be eligible for three weeks holidays after 10 years service with the town.
Hourly paid employees received a five cent an hour increase which, with contributions to the new pension plan will make the total increase 13 cents. Other increases were \$150 annually to the clerk-manager, works superintendent, deputy clerk, sewage plant foreman and \$250 to the assessor and \$100 to the janitor; with \$50 to the stenographer and assistant assessor.
The adjustments are retroactive to January 1.
