Hard throwing lefthander Mike Anderson limited the Milton Red Sox to six hits and four runs, as the Hamilton Cardinals claimed their second win of the season over the Sox on Sunday afternoon. The Steel City squad unleashed a 14 hit attack against two Sox hurlers as they marched to victory and grabbed a slice of second spot in the league standings. The loss brought the Red Sox record for the season to two wins and two losses.

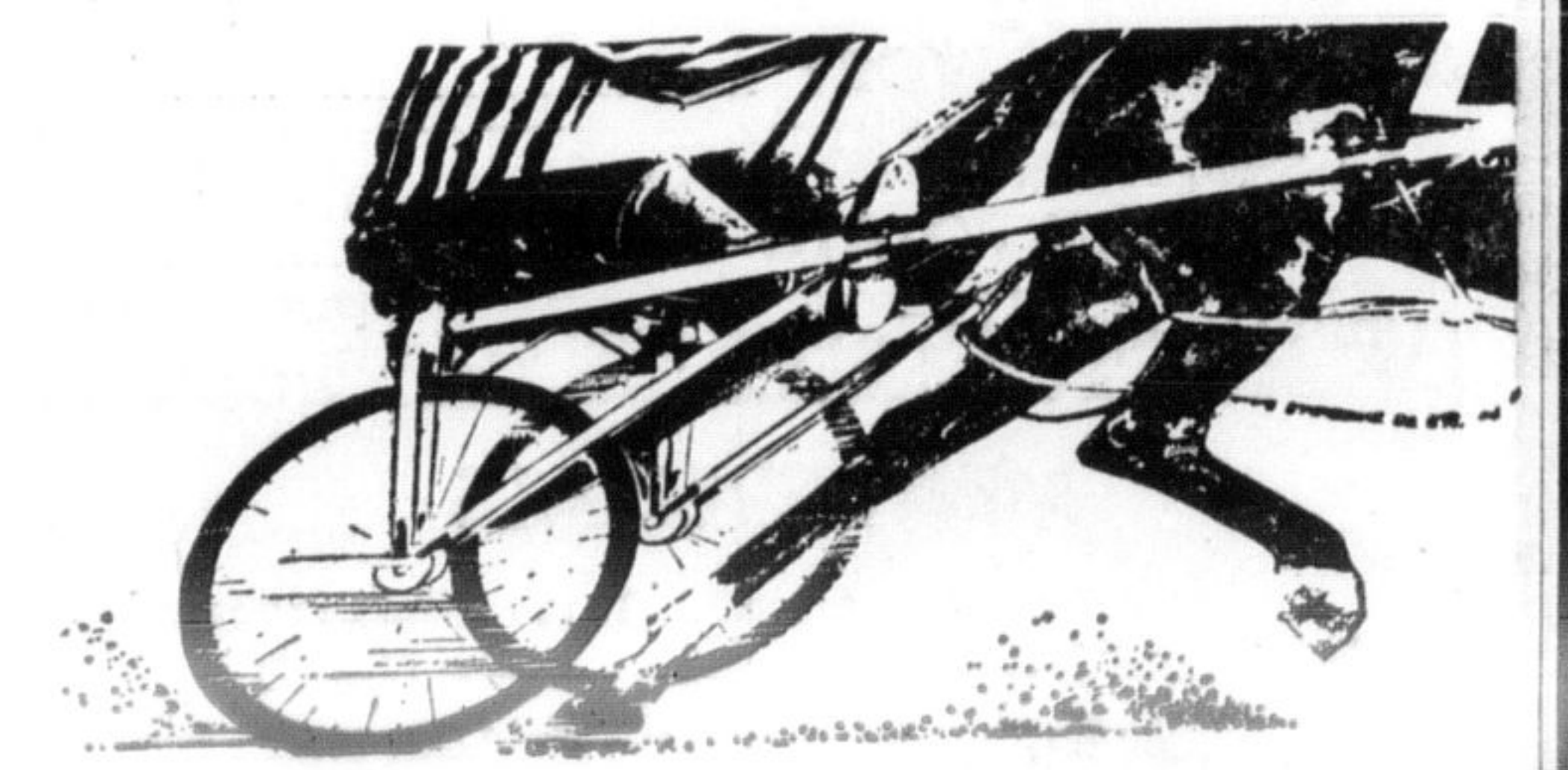
