The Milton District Hospital Auxiliary terminates another eventful year with a Supper Party and Auction Sale at the home of Mrs. W. Harland Merry June 10.

Brief resume brings to mind that the Auxiliary is a "daily" procedure. The blue-smocked volunteers are in evidence each day throughout the year, staffing the attractive Gift Shop afternoons and evening, bringing the Gift Cart and Library Cart to the patients and caring for the beautiful flowers sent to patients.

Many Hours

During the year skillful hands are knitting lovely articles for babies, dressing dolls for the Gift Shop, preparing and sewing in preparation for the various booths at the Garden Party in September. All of which added together, amount to a surprising

number of hours, given so generously by the members.

This Auxiliary belongs to Region No. 5, comprised of 27 Auxiliaries and has had representation on the Board for two years. Spring and Fall Regional meetings are held at the different Hospitals, with three delegates chosen to attend each session. These delegates return with renewed appreciation of the wide scope of daily services being given to patients and staffs, and bring back many useful ideas for money-raising projects.

We were represented at the May Regional Meeting in the Peel Memorial Hospital by Mrs. Helen Marsh, Mrs. Sheilagh Conway and Mrs. Marie Martin, with Mrs. Martin having been invited to speak on the topic of Gift Shops — a topic for which she is ably suited, as evidenced in our own Shop, of which she is convener.

Through the endeavours of the Auxiliary our Hospital not only has a well-equipped Physiotherapy department costing \$3,000 plus a recent addition of a DPK Exerciser Unit (Hydraulic Flexion Unit), but also has a new Blood Bank, 60 pint capacity, large enough to care for additional future expansion of the hospital. The Pediatric Department received a new Baby Tenda and an electric Bottle Warmer. The Laundry now has a Patching Machine, which eliminates many hours of sewing and mending, and the male patients have an electric shaver. The Library Cart also has several new magazine subscriptions.

The members of the Auxiliary are ever mindful of the many interested friends in the community who respond so generously to the Tag Day, Membership Tea, and Garden Party during the year, making these events not only pleasurable but financially successful.

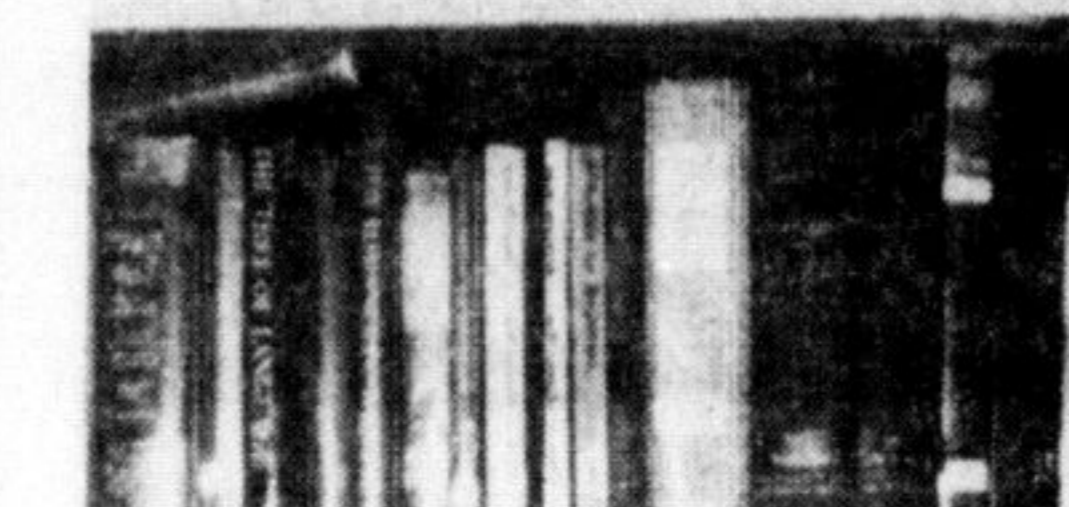

Library Notes

May 19-22 marked the 62nd annual conference of the Ontario Library Association, held this year at the Toronto University and Education Centre, and your librarian was again privileged to attend.

Tuesday, May 19 was registration and in the evening we browsed among the fine books on display at Hart House. These were selected by librarians of some of the larger centres, and had been well chosen indeed. Some of them we already have, but many we do not have.

Tour University

Wednesday a.m. was the general session at which the reports of the committees of O.L.A. were read, and then brief talks were given on Adult Education, Provincial Library, Intellectual Freedom, etc. At 11 a.m., there were to be tours of the University of Toronto Libraries — more than half of the librarians didn't get in on these tours. However I toured these libraries on my own at the end of the conference. Toronto University Library has 9,000 periodicals — in many languages. I recognized three—French, Russian and German (the three languages I have had opportunity to study.)

In the afternoon I attended the Children's Librarian's section at which Miss Donnelly (children's librarian from London) was the speaker. In the evening was the banquet at the Crystal Ballroom where the speaker was Oscar Brand, America's foremost folk minstrel.

Thursday a.m. I took in the Ontario Resources and Technical Recordings, at which Miss Katherine L. Bell of University of Toronto Library spoke.

In the afternoon at the County and Small Libraries section Mr. Snell, chief librarian of Guelph Public Library was the speaker, and in the evening there was a panel discussion of the Intellectual Freedom Committee at which censorship was discussed. Mr. Sudar was moderator, and the speakers D. Coon, Attorney General's Committee on Obscene Literature; H. C. Campbell, chief librarian, Toronto Public Library; R. R. Steele, Past President O.L.T.A.; and H. Kane, McLelland and Stewart.

Next Year — Niagara
Friday morning was the second general session at which next year's officers for O.L.A. were chosen and new resolutions read and adopted, and the con-

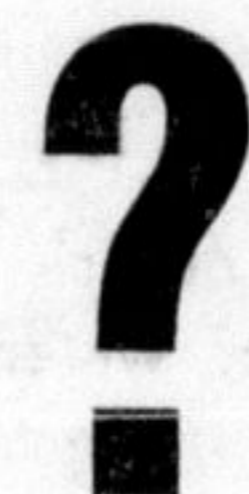
ference place chosen for next year's conference — Niagara.

At the Thursday afternoon session regional libraries were stressed, and Mr. Snell advocated buying all the books in a small library from Co-operative Book Centre. They could be bought all ready to put on the shelves, at no extra cost and one invoice would do for all books bought. That would simplify things, he said.

In the evening Mr. Campbell emphasized that any librarian who was too lazy to shop around for the best book at the least price wasn't worthy to be called a librarian, and that books should be bought from as many sources as possible. This was exactly what Mr. Roedde, head of the Provincial Library had told me during one of my visits there. Certainly it doesn't coincide with Mr. Snell's idea.

And I agree with Mr. Campbell and Mr. Roedde.
