## HALTON COUNTY WEED CONTROL

### YELLOW ROCKET SPREADER

This primary noxious biennial or short lived perennial weed is spreading quickly throughout Ontario. It is also known as Winter Cress. As this weed resembles wild mustard, from a distance, new infections or single plants are often ignored and allowed to set seed. Yellow Rocket will normally grow on low land but does equally well on better locations. Mustard is an annual and will normally grow in cultivated crops only.

Our present heavy infestations have all come from a few neglected plants in a sod area or as an impurity in seed and such will show up very early in the spring following spring seeding. All new seedings should be checked for the presence of these "yellow" weeds. They are easily identified up to 20 rods away as they grow faster and show above any ordinary sod, pasture or hay mixture in May and early June.

### Like Mustard

The flowering arrangement is similar to a mustard plant and may be on a single stem or a close group of up to a dozen stems. If several stems are produced the plant in flower will look like a solid yellow clump. The leaves are a dark glossy

green. The lower leaves may be flat on the ground like a dandelion and have stems with two or three pairs of opposite lobes, the leaf ending in a single large lobe. The stem leaves are alternate and irregular in shape becoming smaller and more closely attached to the stem near the flowering section. The smooth stems may show a purplish tint at ground level. This plant is often difficult to pull as it has a very fibrous tap root system.

The seed is about the size and color of hulled timothy and unless graded seed is purchased it will go unnoticed until the yellow flowers appear in the field a year later. In these cases, bargain seed becomes expensive. Yellow Rocket is a primary noxious weed, and is not allowed in any No. 1 seed, but five may be present in an ounce of No. 2 Timothy or 10 may be present in an ounce of a No. 2 seed mixture. If the odd seed should get by in a No. 1 lot or be spread by any other means a few minutes spent checking the field will be the best weed control you can effect.

Control measures involve the use of No. 1 seed; if only a few plants show up they can be pulled; if a heavy infestation consult Ontario Department of Agriculture.

# Widen QEW to Six Lanes

As part of a long-range program of widening the Queen Elizabeth Way to six lanes between Toronto and Hamilton, the Department of Highways has awarded a contract for the widening of a 2.8 mile section between the Highway 25 interchange and the Freeman interchange. The project also involves widening of Highway 25 interchange and one other structure as well as construction of two new structures.

The increased traffic volume since the opening of Highway 403 has further necessitated an early

widening of this section. **Over 2,000,000** The contract includes grading, drainage, granular base, hot-mix paving and structures. The cost has been estimated at \$2½ million, exclusive of acquisition of extra right-of-way estimated at \$96,000.

To permit construction of an underpass for Service Road No. 1, north of the westbound lane of the Q.E.W., one mile west of Highway 25, a detour will channel westbound traffic into the eastbound lane for the duration of the underpass construction. Thus the eastbound lane will carry traffic in both directions until completion of the underpass.

The project will require excavation of 200,000 cubic yards of earth as well as earth borrow

of some 250,000 cubic yards. A total of 250,000 tons of granular base will go into the job which will require 50,000 tons of hot-mix paving material.

The new structures and the widening of the existing ones will take an estimated 4,000 cubic yards of concrete and about 5,500 tons of steel of various types.

The project also includes the realignment of No. 1 Service Rd. north of the Q.E.W. This will require the construction of a new underpass under the westbound lane, as well as widening of Highway 25.

The other structures on this section will be widened to provide for an extra lane in each direction.

Completion of the project has been scheduled for the summer of 1965.

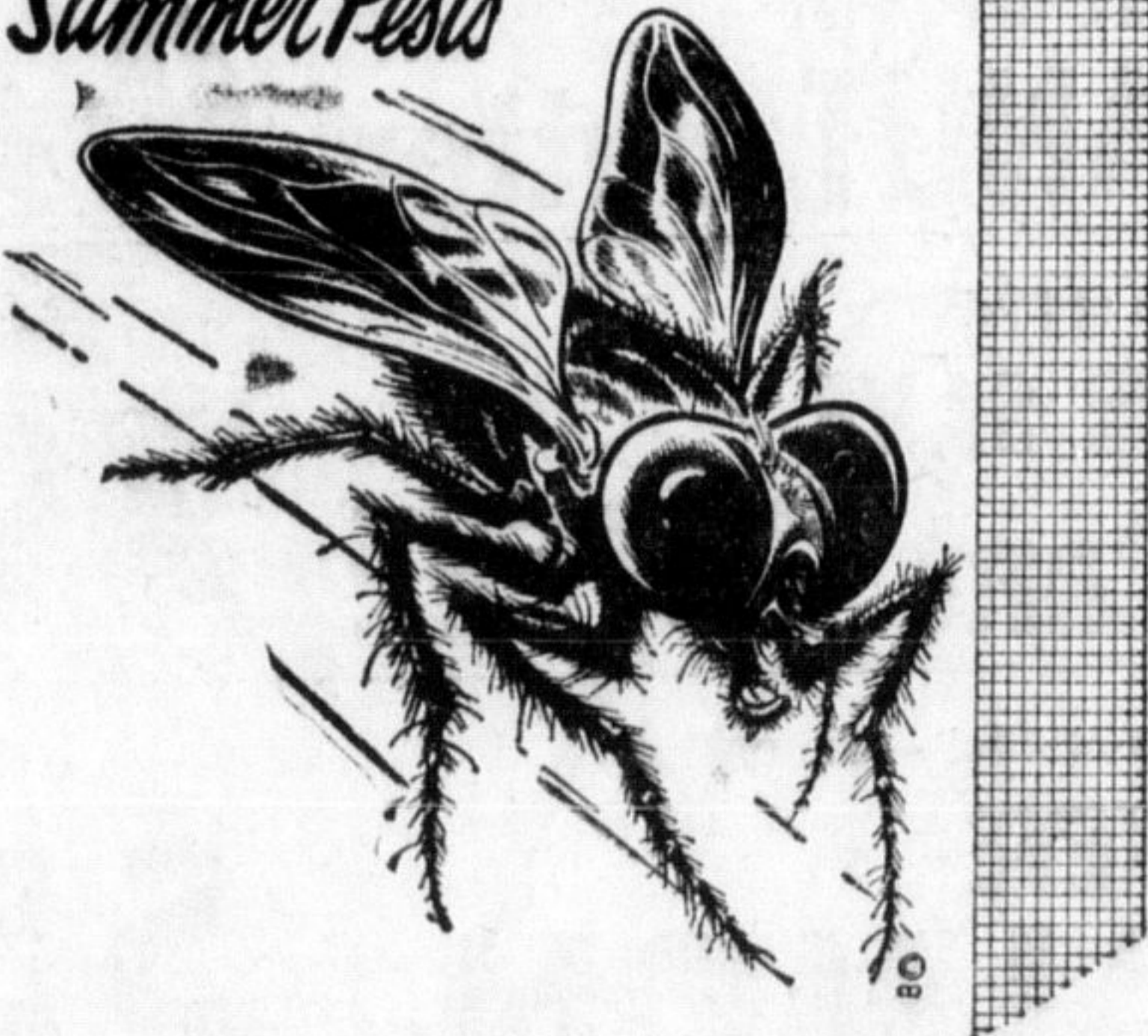

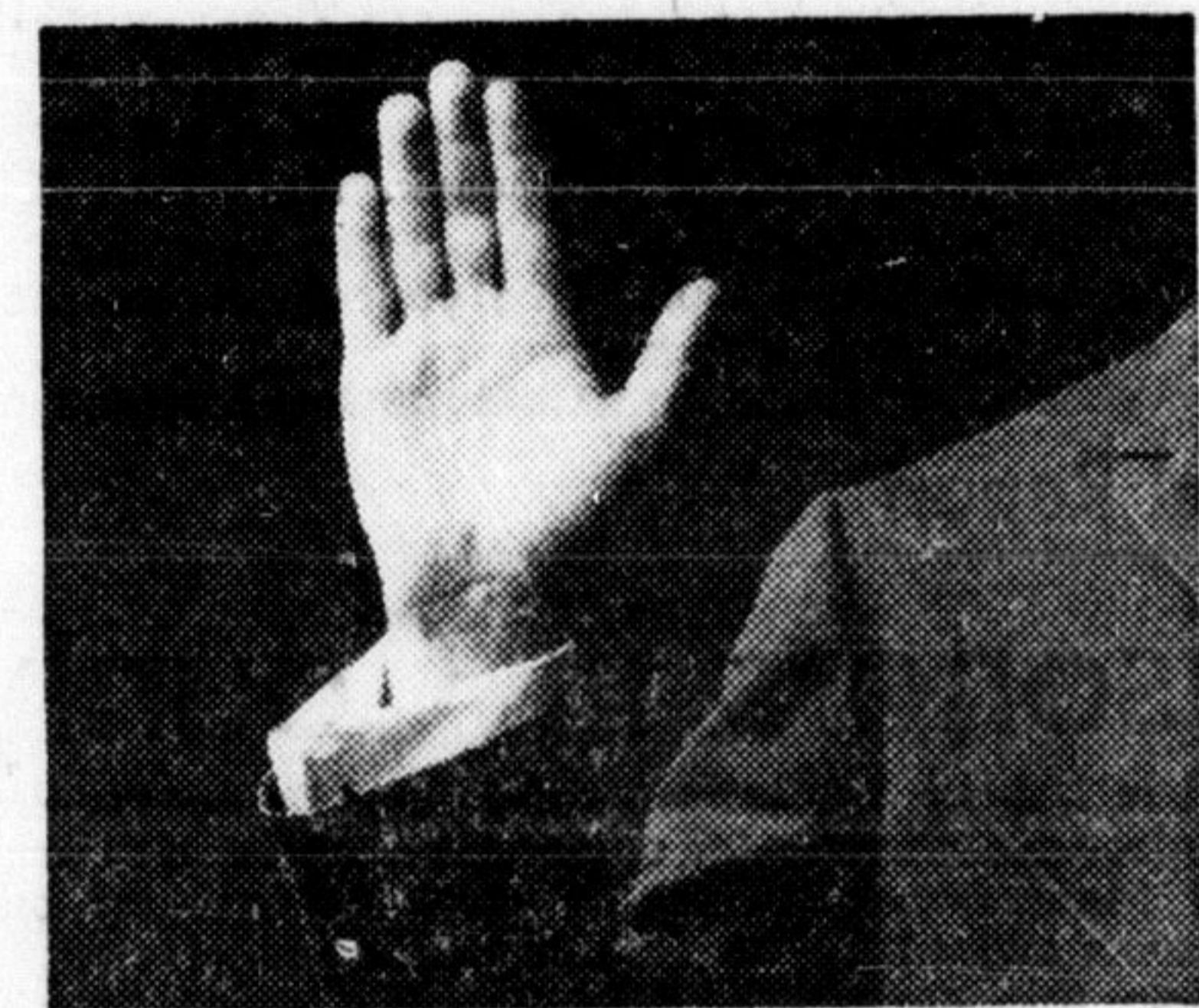
