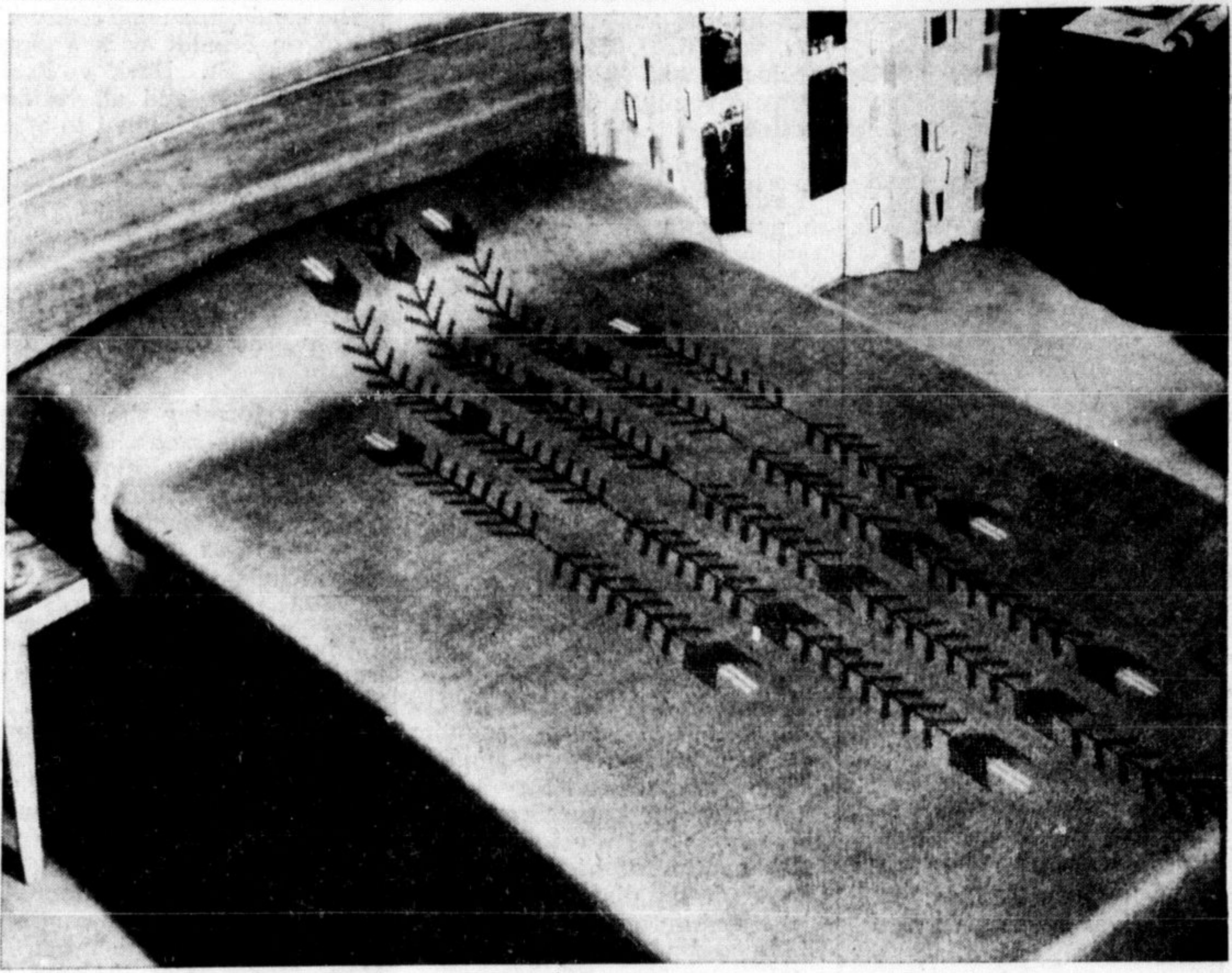
Several from Kilbride attended the Upper Burlington Citizens Forum Wednesday evening at Fairview school.

Best Man — Hero for a Day

The real hero of the wedding day is the best man. He may be the groom's closest friend, his older brother or other relative.

On the wedding day, the best man is responsible for remembering the ring, packing the groom's bags, helping him to dress, delivering him at the right church 20 minutes ahead of time, complete with marriage licence.

He sees that the ushers are accounted for, properly attired and in possession of their boutonnières. He arranges with the usher to hand the groom and himself their hats and coats at the door when the wedding party is leaving.

He presents the clergyman with his fee as quietly as possible, usually in the vestry before the service, carries the bride's wedding ring in his waistcoat pocket, sustains the groom before the service and stands at his right hand during the ceremony. He gives the ring when the clergyman asks for it.

He escorts the maid-of-honor to the vestry on his left arm, witnesses the signing of the register, returns in the recessional with the maid-of-honor on his right arm, squires her to the reception and manages to arrive ahead of the guests after seeing that the ushers are going straight from church to the reception.

At the reception, he replies to the bridesmaids' toast and reads out telegrams of congratulations. He helps the groom change for the honeymoon trip and takes charge of his wedding clothes, checks on the going-away car, sees that the groom has his wallet, tickets, passports, travelers' cheques, marriage certificate and confirmation of hotel reservation.

He resists any impulse to stuff the luggage with confetti before stowing it in the car, runs interference for the bridal couple at the get-away.

his council duties. The section was 50 square miles in area.

"The town has been going nicely on a nine-ward system," he commented. "Don't let us upset the people now."

Councillor Humphreys wanted the town to continue the nine-ward system but he was willing to shift boundaries to equalize populations.

"I have had all kinds of calls from people in my area — Aldershot — objecting to any change," he said.

"Rep by Pop"
Mayor Owen Mullin felt the eight-ward recommendation was fair. He thought representation by population should prevail. It was noted that the northern section only had 3,392 people.

Councillor Ellerbeck felt the five-ward plan would "solve a lot of problems." But it failed to find favor with council.

Under this plan, each ward would have representation on all major committees. Councillor George Harrington suggested that the boundary lines for the new Wards 4, 7 and 8 be moved up to No. 1 sideroad. They were only to extend to the Upper Middle Road.

Councillor Lawrence Fox proposed that the new Wards 7 and 8 in the eastern section extend the town's northern borders.

Mayor Mullin said this was impractical as it would deny the north representation on council. The bulk of the population in each of these wards was along the lake front.
