

Watch Immigrants For Typhoid Fever

Halton County has reported no cases of typhoid fever since 1959. Dr. A. F. Bull, Halton Medical Officer of Health said this week. However anyone coming into Halton from Scotland is being closely watched for the disease, following the fever outbreak in Aberdeen.

"We are advised of the arrival of these people by the Provincial Department of Health, and we will be following each one for a two week period to make certain that there is no evidence of illness resembling typhoid fever," Dr. Bull said.

Dr. Bull recalled in 1900 Ontario's typhoid death rate was 20 per 100,000, with a case rate of 70 per 100,000. In 1960, he added, there were only 22 Ontario cases and no deaths. He praised today's effective methods of treatment, and said Halton had five cases in 1950, one in 1953, one in 1956 and one in 1959.

Last Day

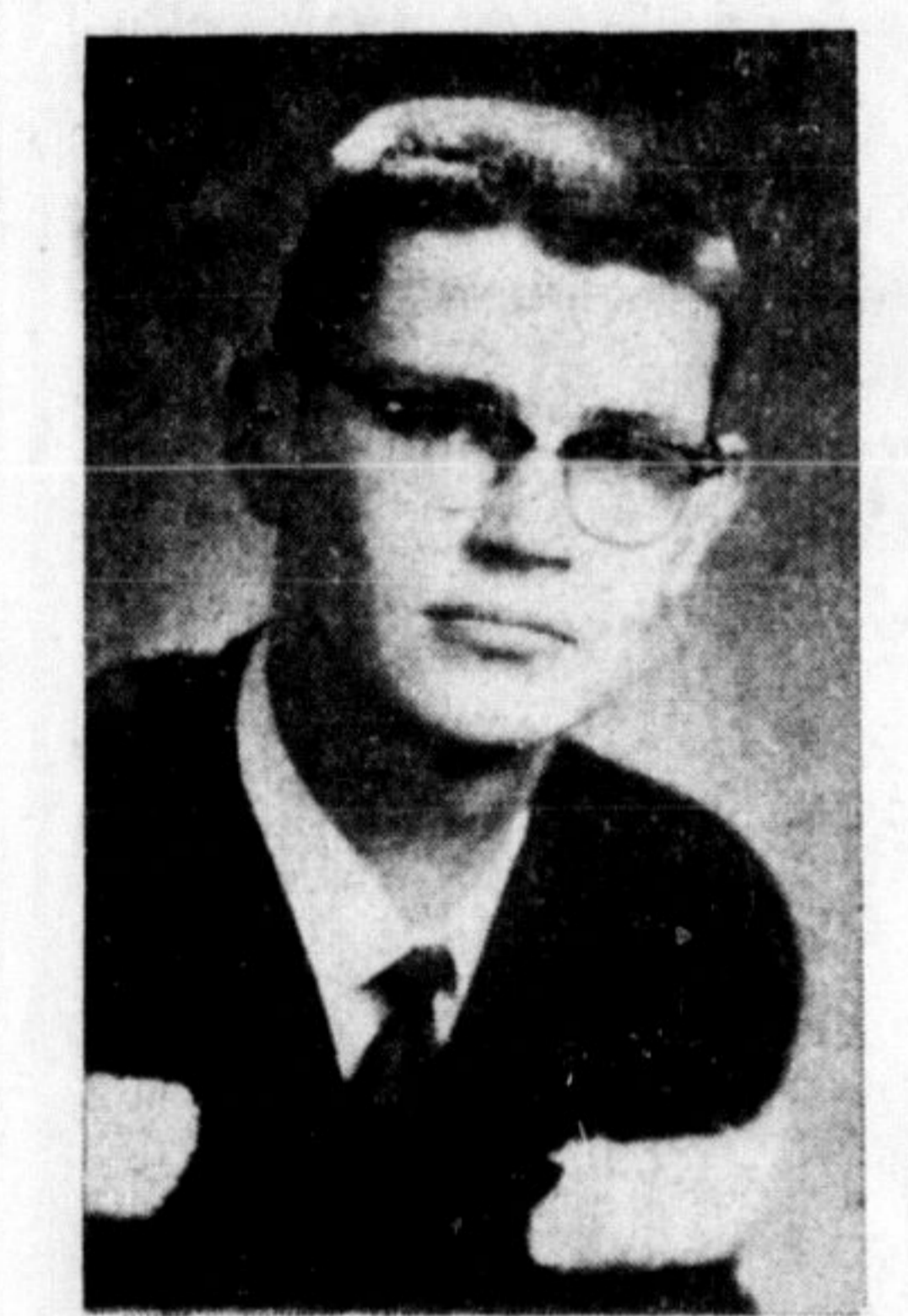

Heights, Peru Ask Water Town Won't Alter Line

Despite a petition from 89 residents outside the town, Milton Council declined to alter the route of the water transmission line that will carry water to the town from the Kelso well.

The petition asked the town to consider bringing the line along the county road through Milton Heights and Peru rather than along Highway 401 to Highway 25.

Short Now

The petition noted many in that area already suffer from a water shortage, and should the pumping at Kelso affect the water table in the area, the town would be directly responsible for reimbursement on the damage. Petitioners suggested a majority of them would apply immediately for water service, thus reducing the extra cost involved in the rerouting.

Engineer K. Hyde told members of council the route petitioners sought would add approximately \$40,000 to the cost of the line. An additional three weeks would be required to lay out a new route at this point, he suggested, and the construction period would be extended by about a month because of the different ground conditions encountered.

No Change Asked

Reeve C. A. Martin explained the water committee did not recommend a change in the route, but felt councillors should be aware of the petition and its implications.

A letter from the Halton Region Conservation Authority asked the town to consider an underground pumping station at Kelso. The engineers strongly advised against this for this size of installation. They pointed out that neither they, nor the Ontario Water Resources Commission were aware of any similar sized underground stations. The necessity for explosion proof wiring and motors plus construction would add to the cost of the building as well.

The engineers agreed to prepare a sketch of a proposed above-ground pumping station for submission to the Authority, in line with the architecture of existing area buildings.

Enough Until 2,000

Members questioned the engineer at length on the adequacy of the 12 inch water line they proposed from the Kelso well to town. Engineer Hyde emphasized the 12 inch line will carry two and a half to three million gallons daily. One pump to provide a million gallons daily would be installed now, with room in the pump house for addition of a further pump when the demand developed. A 14 inch main would be far greater than would be needed at the present time. He suggested that three million gallons, if it were available, from the present source — coupled with the present supply of one million gallons — should be adequate to meet the demand to the year 2,000 in line with present growth trends.

Questioned about the present town supply that comes through a 12 inch main, the engineer suggested the increase of pump capacity at the source and the elimination of the present surge tank, could increase the supply to town. He noted the surge tank feeds to the reservoir and yet it is only 12 feet above the reservoir elevation.

Not Needed Now
Questioned about the cost differential if a 14 inch line was installed rather than the recommended 12 inch line, the engineer estimated costs would increase about \$40,000 "and you don't need it for 20 years."

Council agreed to leave the subject of the size of the line until completion of testing at the well, when the amount of water available will be determined.

Dealing with the matter of an underground station at Kelso, the engineer pointed out hatch covers and vents required above the ground would be more unsightly than a building properly landscaped and maintained.

Checking on the approvals still necessary, the calling of tenders, the still unresolved design of the pump house, the necessity to complete tests at Kelso and the Ontario Municipal Board approval, Councillor B. Best finally quipped "It'll be Christmas before we get the line in."

Plaque Inscription

The bronze plaque to be unveiled reads "Kelso Conservation Area, dam built by the Province of Ontario and the Sixteen-Mile Creek Conservation Authority, 1962. Where there is no vision, the people perish. (Proverbs 29: 18.)"

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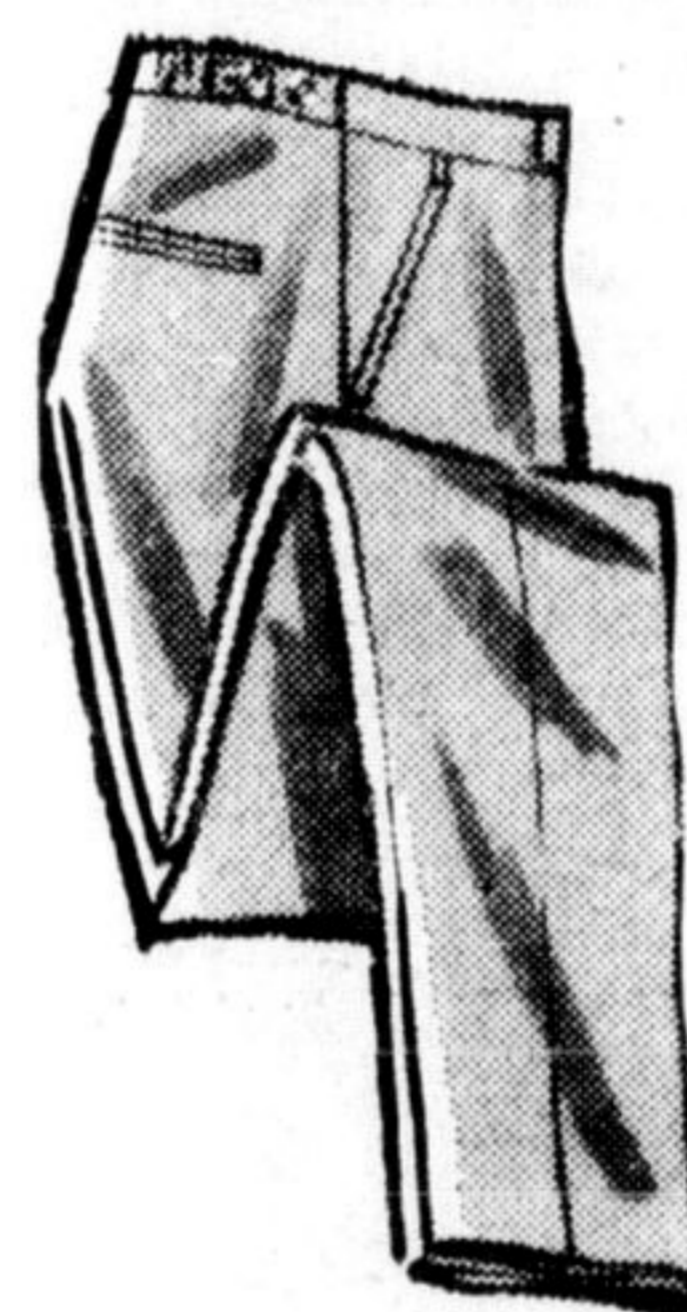
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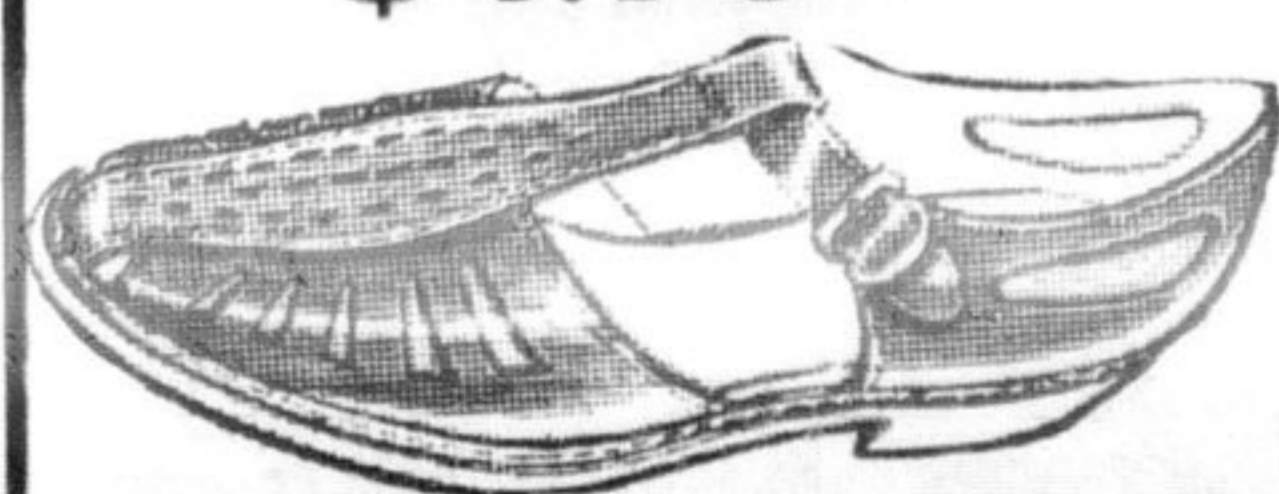
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
