Watch Immigrants For Typhoid Fever

Halton County has reported no cases of typhoid fever since 1959, Dr. A. F. Bull, Halton Medical Officer of Health said this week. However anyone coming into Halton from Scotland is being closey watched for the disease, following the fever outbreak Aberdeen.

"We are advised of the arrival of these people by the Provincial Department of Health, and we will be following each one for a two week period to make certain that there is no evidence of illness ressembling typhoid fever," Dr. Bull said.


