Harvey Philip Hydro Employee

A former employee of Milton Hydro Commission, Harvey R. Philip of 495 MacDonald Rd., Oakville died Saturday at Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial Hospital. Funeral service was held in Oakville, Tuesday, and interment followed at Evergreen Cemetery, Milton.

Mr. Philip, 56, came to Milton from Mount Forest and worked for Milton Hydro several years before going to the Hamilton P. U.C. and then Trafalgar Township P.U.C., which he managed for almost 20 years. He was assistant construction manager of North York Hydro System at his death.

He was a past master of St. Clair Masonic Lodge, Milton, and a past Principal of Royal Arch Masons. He is survived by his wife, the former Ivy Bundy, and two sons Robert of Burlington and William in Germany. Two granddaughters also survive.

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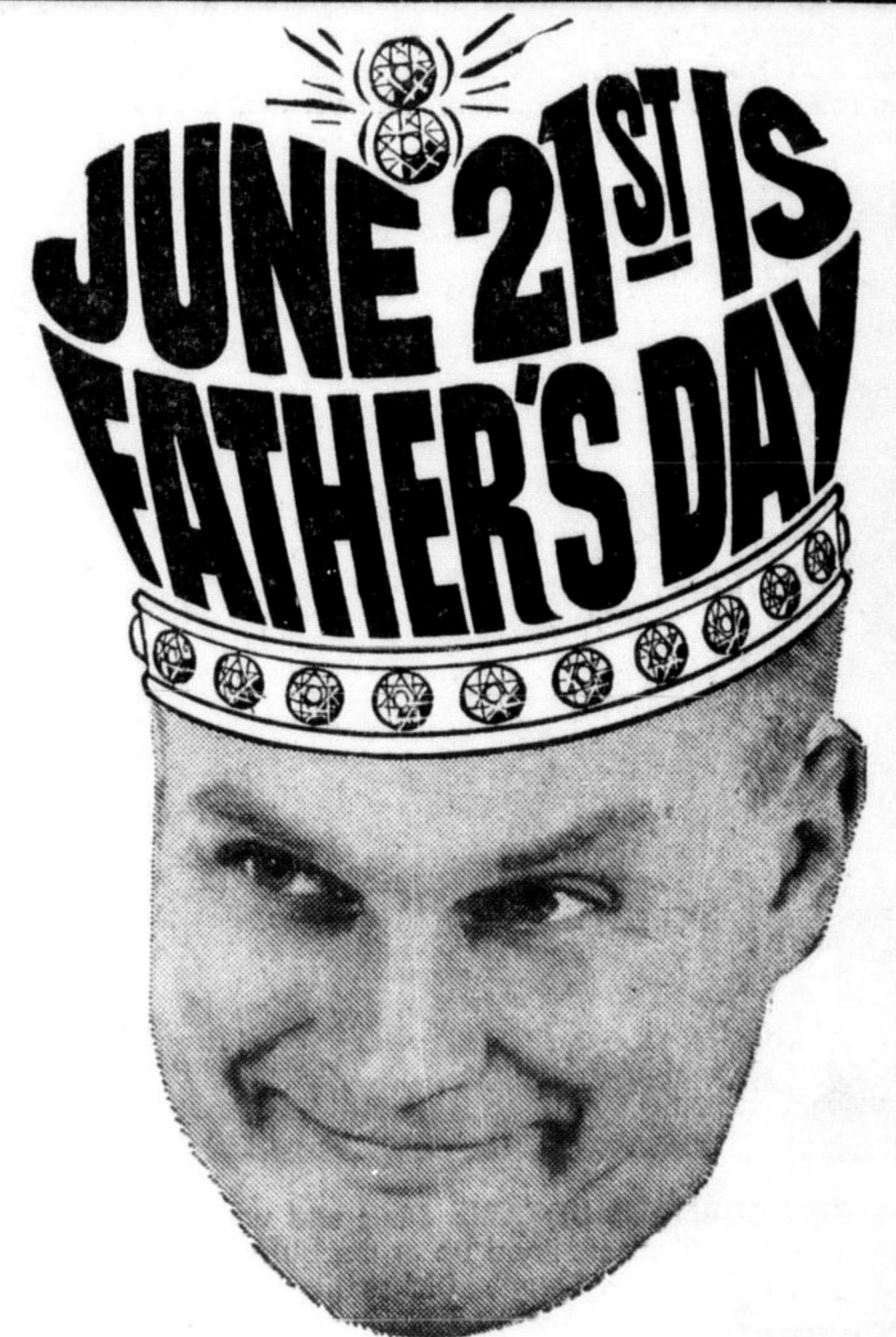
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
