Transplant Them

In fact, I have known houseweeds can be beautiful! The O.A.C. used to have a "weed flower bed" situated near the Field Husbandry building. It was not maintained for beautification purposes although it was very attractive, but rather for education as it contained nearly all the Common weeds of Ontario. each bearing its name. Orange Hawkweed is often callto Dave Leaver for his generous ed Devil's Paint Brush because of its bright orange-red flowers borne in clusters on the top of a nearly leafless stem that grows from twelve to eighteen inches high. This weed is a real problem in permanent pastures in Northern Ontario.

Small Flowers

King Devil is troublesome mainly in Eastern Ontario. It is much like Orange Hawkweed but The next stop was on the No. may be distinguished by its small, yellow flowers.


All these weeds are easily killed by cultivation. Infested hay and pasture fields should be plowed if possible, and put under a short rotation of crops. Chemical weed killers should be used on rocky or hilly pastures that cannot be plowed. The current years' growth may be killed by one application of 8-oz. of 2, 4-D acid per acre in late July or early September. To kill the roots, however, several treatments of 16-oz. of

2, 4-D per acre must be applied. It must be remembered that these rates of 2, 4-D will also kill grasses will be unharmed, so it is practical to spray these weeds, therefore, only when they are present in pure or nearly pure grass
